I OOKING GOOD!

The shopping parades on Hinckley Road and Woodgate have got that summer feeling as hanging baskets and flower fountains exploded into colour.

The Hinckley Road shops (Western Park Row Traders) managed to secure £747 from the Ward budget with the remainder put in by Sunshine Studios.

The flowers outside the Resources Centre and along Woodgate were organised by the Wood-

gate Residents Association. There are twenty one shops and houses participating with a total of sixty baskets plus extra planters at the front of the Resources Centre. They have also replanted nine large concrete planters outside the old Premier Screw site which are due to be painted in the next couple of weeks.

Funding for this has come from the Lottery through the Awards for All programme, De Montfort University's Square Mile Project and Leicester City Council and the Royal Horticultural Societv's "It's Your neighbourhood" Programme.

The association believes this has greatly improved the main street of Woodgate and has received many positive compliments from residents and those using the Woodgate Resources Centre and local shops.

National Forest

It is now almost twenty years since the formation of the National Forest Company. It was several years before, that the idea of a national forest began to take shape, given impetus by the closure of so many pits in the Derbyshire and Leicestershire coalfield

The achievements of the past twenty years have been pretty impressive. The planting of 8 million new trees is in itself quite a feat. At least two major visitor attractions have also put the area well and truly on the tourist map. The idea of a National Arboretum commemorat-



ing those who gave their lives in so many conflicts has now really taken shape near Alrewas in Staffordshire and has been attracting sizeable crowds all summer long. Conkers, on the site of the former Rawdon Pit near Moira, has become a firm favourite, particularly with families.

Trees of course do not spring up overnight but a comparison between an up to date Ordnance Survey map and one published a few years back will really show the progress being made, if one looks for example at the area around Bagworth or Battram Wood (Near Ibstock off the A447). Many of these new plantations are by private individuals but there has also been a useful degree of input by local authorities, bodies such as the Woodland Trust and Severn Trent Water, and support from a whole range of voluntary organizations.

The Forestry Centre at Rosliston just across the border in Derbyshire, and which also boasts an excellent cafe, is one not to be missed.

Places such as Bradgate Park and Thornton Reservoir, both within the boundaries of the National Forest, will be familiar to most city residents. Other sites such as Moira Furnace and some reopened northern stretches of the Ashby Canal are a little further afield.

Walkers and Ramblers are faced with a wide range of attractive paths throughout the forest, including a section of the 100 mile Leicestershire Round which runs over Charnwood Forest. Most recently the National Trust has bought Gimson's Stoneywell Cottage, near Ulverscroft, which is being opened to visitors.

It really is great to have such an interesting new creation on our doorstep.

Car Con Man Jailed

A man from Tetuan Road has been locked up for 13 months for his involvement in a car sales scam.

32 year old Adam Pinchess rinsed £14,400, from the con, through his bank account.

The scam which involved a fictitious garage in Inverness offering cars for sale in Auto Trader; duped customers into handing over large amounts of money up front for non-existent vehicles.

Four victims lost up to £1000 each with a fifth losing his whole £10,500 payment. Pinchess was arrested after being traced by his bank account details which had been given to the victims.

At Leicester Crown Court he admitted five counts of possessing criminal property and pleaded guilty to two offences of failing to appear in court.

During sentencing, Judge Lynn Tayton said: "People lost substantial amounts. There was no company and no vehicles... You provided the bank account into which the payments were made... You say a traveller was the main protagonist and you kept 10 per cent, £1,440".

In mitigation, Olwen Davis said: "A number of people have been prosecuted in these circumstances & travellers are a theme that runs through all five of these similar cases...It was when he was down on his luck that he fell into temptation".

Western Park Golf Club STILL OPEN & THE FIGHT GOES ON

West Leicester's golfers are up in arms following the likely closure of Western Park Golf Course in October 2015 as part of cost saving measures.

City Mayor Sir Peter Sousby made the proposal following a three month consultation over the future of Leicester's two municipal golf courses. He cited the £126,000 subsidy cost as the reason for Western Park's closure but promised investment in the remaining Humberstone Heights course.



The decision has already had a dramatic effect on the Western Park club's membership. Hugh Linden who runs the bar and catering said: "People think the course is closed now. It isn't but we lost 60 members when the announcement was made. "It's another knife into the coffin but we've got a members' AGM to boost support and we'll try and persuade him to have a change of heart".

Club committee members have had several meetings with Sir Peter, answering his questions and trying to hammer out ways to save money. Suggestions included helping with general course maintenance and a plan to lower prices.

Hugh Linden added: "Some courses have special rates and our T-off



times aren't competitive. Make it cheaper and they'll be an influx. This is one of the best courses in Leicester and we have to increase numbers".

Veteran player Stuart Thornley added that the real problem has been lack of investment: "We've only had basic maintenance over the years. This should be the jewel in the crown - not shut".

The council have launched a second consultation to seek views on the closure of the Western Park course whilst investing in Humberstone Heights.

NY Goes NUTS for Academia

A composer from West Leicester is on the verge of huge US success as the musical he scored scooped major awards in the New York Music Festival.

Julian Blackmore originally from Western Park has written the music for a hit "nerd rock" opera called Academia Nuts. It tells the tale of "dreamy-eyed brainiac Maggie McCutter hoping to win a scholarship so she can escape her controlling mother. Maggie's world is turned upside down as she falls for a football-loving opponent".



Acadamia Nuts picked up Best Director, Best Individual Performances, Honorable Mentions for Excellence in Book and Lyric Writing and the Play By Play Best New Musical Award.

Julian who studied at New Parks Community College before heading to Gateway $6^{\rm th}$ Form and then

the University of Leeds, currently lives and works in New York. He said: "I came here to study for a masters in musical theatre writing at NYU in 2008 and stayed here ever since. It's a prime city for a musician and composer to work in; you're surrounded by so much inspiration and opportunity. I split my time between playing and writing, and find I am always having to turn down opportunities - there's

so much going on". Julian and his cocreators Dan Marshall and Becca Anderson worked on Academia Nuts for four years with various reading and concert performances along the way as the show developed.



"We had the idea for a musical set in the quizbowl; kind of like University Challenge for high school age kids. We sat down and outlined the story and characters together, then everything grew from there in a very organic way".

Academia Nuts ran during the New York Musical Festival from the 9th - 13th July to rave reviews. Julian commented: "It was Fantastic - the audience really loves the show! We sold out our run and picked up several festival awards including Best



New Musical.

Although Academia Nuts had a very popular first run; Will it ever academia see the light of day again? Julian is optimistic: "The short answer is ves; based on our undying faith and tenacity in making things happen, but



where and when we don't know yet. As a writing team we're talking to a couple of theaters and producers about a future production of this show.

"New musical theatre projects, with this team, include a true-crime action adventure set in the 70s, and a small Christmas show. Solo projects include more production music for TV and media. and a long-overdue second album of ambient music".

Martyrs Memorial

A Special memorial display marking the beginning of the First World war was held at the Church of the Martyrs on Westcotes Drive.

185 local men perished in the war with the youngest being only 16. Most of the men named on the memorial board display were killed in action or died from their wounds, but some succumbed to illness, accidents and in one case suicide.

The commemoration involved, music, poetry and reflection and culminated in a special vigil service to mark the outbreak of war.

August Police Update

She was initially given the chance to take part in the Alcohol Awareness Scheme, which offers offenders the chance to address their alcohol problems without gaining a criminal conviction, but failed to attend. Sne was arrested a few days later on Letchworth Road for being drunk & disorderly and has now been charged with disorderly behaviour.

On Wednesday evening, 9 July, a local resident reported a man acting suspiciously in the back gardens of Westleigh Road. When officers arrived, he made off, running through gardens and over fences. As officers chased him, a number of members of the public shouted directions from their houses, thereby enabling the man to be apprehended near to the KFC on Narborough Road. A 23 year old man from Braunstone Town was arrested but unfortunately there was insufficient evidence to charge him with any offences. The police are grateful for the assistance that we received from members of the local community.

On 14 July, a burglary took place at the old Empire Hotel where offenders smashed their way through a brick wall from an adjourning property. A thirty one year old local man was detained at the scene and has been subsequently charged with burglary.

Tony Huxley's Compost Corner



Cut flowers have been used to decorate homes for centuries, possibly millennia. I'm sure even aesthetic Neanderthals dragged floral prizes back to the family cave; in fact I'm told they were even known to line graves with freshly picked flowers. Now here we are 12,000 years later and we pay florists for imported blooms or buy pre-wilted bouquets from garage forecourts.

Few of us would contemplate growing flowers to cut for the house. But in the Elizabethan times, and earlier, many bigger houses had special "cutting gardens" for this purpose. I've recently considered reviving this practice after my wife attended a friend's funeral. A long illness gave her friend time to plan. One specification was for mourners to bring flowers and greenery from their own gardens. It created a perfumed piece of English summer, beautifully engaging those who came to say goodbye.

Creating a cutting garden doesn't require vast amounts of room. You can bulk up quantities of productive plants in existing borders so harvesting doesn't leave gardens flowerless. An important consideration is to allow access to the plants. Perennials may take several years to produce worthwhile amounts of blooms. Annuals like Salvia viridis and Cosmos will produce profuse amounts of summer blooms in one season. Picking flowers from plants such as sweet peas can



stimulate the plant to produce even more. The fragrance of sweet peas and scented roses is hard to beat but herbs like lemon balm, mint and fennel can also bring a natural perfume into the house. Don't forget to use interesting foliage plants, grasses like *Miscanthus*, shrubs like *Pittosporum* and ferns possibly *Dryopteris*.

For best results cut flowers in the morning. Check ahead and If the plants are dry water the night before. Use a sharp knife or secateurs to avoid damaging the stems. Select flowers that are just starting to open, not in full bloom or tight bud. And most importantly, enjoy bringing your garden into your home.
