NEW COLLEGE MEANS BUSINESS

BACK TO GLASTONBUDGET

After two years of thumb twiddling, Glastonbudget roared back to Turnpost Farm in Wymesworld with a spectacular three-days of classic tribute acts and local music.

Whilst many celebrated the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, over 8000 of us committed treason and went to a big field in Leicestershire, in the company of some of the world's most iconic stars - sort of. Glastonbudget is still the world's best tribute and new music festival, and it didn't disappoint.

There was a distinct Royal theme to this year's shenanigans. Alongside a Guinness world record attempt to get the most people together wearing paper crowns, the magnificent Queen tribute group, Mercury, strode the main stage on Thursday evening as Joseph Lee Jackson personified Freddie's iconic vocals in a full-on show.



I'm not sure what The Queen would have thought of Friday's nod to the Jubilee through the eyes of Johnny Rotten, but tribute band, The Pistols, managed to accurately reflect the "uniqueness" of the Sex Pistols rendition of God Save The Queen. They were still good n' tight but being better musicians and performers than the original didn't save them from narrow source material. Punk has not aged well.

No matter what your musical tastes, and you won't like everything, there are crowd pleasers aplenty across the three-field site. While we'll never see Amy Winehouse, The Police (probably), Bowie, Thin Lizzy and many others live on stage again, their avatars in the form of exceptionally talented musicians, keep their musical spirit alive.

There's an ever-expanding nostalgia market being catered for by some big budget, full scale shows that are about as close to the original as it's possible to get without having a Tardis.

Some are uncannily accurate, like Pure Paloma. She was so close, for a second, I thought it was Paloma Faith trolling herself.



Glastonbudget is still good value for money and still a great way for kids to dip their toes into festival life. The music is popular, familiar, well performed by the country's best tribute artists, and there's enough to do if you're camping overnight or going VIP.

June Police Update

Police recently executed a misuse of drugs act warrant on Glenfield Road relating to the following vlague of Class Α druas information received from the local **community.** We continue to disrupt the supply and production of drugs in the West End with cannabis plants being recovered from addresses on Ainsdale Road, Vaughan Street and Cranmer Street following warrants being executed.

Information from the community is instrumental in this disruption. Suspicious activity can be reported by calling 101, visiting the Leicestershire police website or reporting your concerns anonymously to CrimeStoppers via their website or freephone telephone number 0800 555 111.

Five people were arrested following a disturbance being reported on Rally Park where weapons and drugs were recovered; the investigation into this is ongoing. The new CCTV cameras and eagle-eyed members of the public assisted the officers in swiftly locating and safely arresting the suspects.

There has been an increase in reports of theft from vehicles, in a lot of cases the cars have been left insecure, so please keep them locked, your keys safe and don't leave any valuable items in your vehicle where possible. Catalytic converter thefts are still occurring due to the rare and valuable metals they contain. Please try to park your car where it restricts access to the underneath.

Continuing with the vehicle theme, several vehicles have been seized which were being driven by people without insurance or a driving licence. Stopping these cars leads to the identification of other criminal offences. A recent stop-check of a vehicle, that had no insurance, led to the recovery of £5000 in cash and two people being arrested for offences under the Proceeds of Crime Act.

New signs are going up on Western Park soon informing those who chose to illegally use motor vehicles there about Sec 59 of the Police Reform Act which will increase our chances of seizing the vehicles of those responsible.

StreetSafe is a pilot service for anyone to anonymously tell us about public places where you have felt or feel unsafe, because of environmental issues, like street lighting, abandoned buildings or vandalism or because of some behaviours, such as being followed or verbally abused. 'StreetSafe' is not for reporting crime or incidents, but if something has happened to you or someone you know, including in public spaces online, you can call us on 101 or report online.

CAREY'S COMPOST

I've spent the last few weeks tidying up the garden and giving certain plants the 'Chelsea Chop'. This is usually carried out on perennials such as Sedum, Phlox, Penstemon, Campanula and Achillea in late May. Pruning this way enables a longer and later flowering season. Perennials can either be pruned back completely or just by half. If you cut it all back, flowering is delayed by around five weeks, but by taking off half you tend to get a longer flowering period. It's not an exact science, as plants can be affected by the amount of rainfall and temperature levels. I try the two different pruning methods on different plants each year to compare the results.

I'm always looking for inspiration so in May, for the first time, I went to London for the Chelsea Flower Show.

I had a very enjoyable day there, but was a little underwhelmed at the size of the gardens. They look so much bigger on the TV! Even so, I took many interesting ideas away from the exhibits.

Two gardens in particular stood out for me: A Rewilding Britain Landscape and The Perennial Garden With Love. Monty Don said that

"Rewilding Britain wasn't actually a garden, more of a landscape and beaver home". But, seeing it with my own eyes, there were lots of elements that can be recreated in a garden. So why not be more in tune with nature by using only native

plants, for example? I was incredibly impressed with The Perennial Garden (pictured), not only because it was on behalf of a charity which is close to my heart (helping Gardeners, landscapers and designers in times of need), but also the planting scheme and colourways were exceptional. It really was a "classical and contemporary design" instilling a feeling of calm and



tranquillity. In particular, I admired the four multistemmed Parrotia persica trees, which flanked a contemporary stream. These were under-planted with dark purple lupins, white alliums, roses and foxgloves. A sculptural element was provided by clipped box and Portuguese laurels. It was a beautiful garden and the local wildlife appreciated it too. Plants were covered in bees and butterflies whilst the local birds sang from the tree tops.
