#### CANNABIS GROW UP IN FLAMES

A rented terraced house on Dunster Street, opposite the Hinckley Road parade of shops, went up in flames on Sept 30th.

Five homes were evacuated as firefighters from across Leicester tackled the blaze which destroyed the roof and damaged properties on either side of the house.

Investigations into the cause of the fire revealed an overload in an electricity bypass used to power the cultivation of forty cannabis plants growing in the attic.

No arrests have been made but enquiries are continuing. Sgt Spencer Dyer based at Hinckley Road police station says that cannabis farms are an ongoing problem in West Leicester: "... since the beginning of this year in the



Westcotes, Fosse, New Parks and Braunstone and Rowley Fields beat area we've identified 25 cannabis grows.

"These have been a combination of smaller 'personal' type grows to larger more organised set ups costing and producing thousands of pounds of illegal drugs. "Of these 25 premises all were in residential areas and many were terraced or semi- detached properties but thankfully only 2 were located following fires breaking out."

In June 2011 one of Leicester's biggest cannabis farm was discovered in the derelict Blue Moon pub on Carlisle Street. Police removed plants and equipment worth tens of thousands of pounds, but this was an exceptionally large haul.

As on Dunster Street, the majority of organised cannabis grows are purposely set up in residential areas. To save money many hook directly into the mains which creates an extremely dangerous cocktail of water and electricity.

Residential cannabis farms are a growing national problem, with rental properties the prime location. Sgt Dyer added: "Landlords have additional responsibilities to ensure that tenants are genuine and should take reasonable steps to upkeep and maintain the property. But the public can help by looking out for new occupants who are rarely seen or attending the property at odd times; windows with a lot of condensation and curtains or plastic sheeting up at all times; bags of compost, plastic pots, lights, transformers or unusual fan-like noises and pungent smells.

"Check your loft if you suspect there is one next door or nearby - let us know, which includes confidentially and we can do the rest."

#### ECHOES OF SLAVERY

It is interesting that the Leicester area contained a number of local figures very much involved in working towards the abolition of the slave trade and of slavery itself. Prominent among these was the radical Leicester campaigner Elizabeth Heyrick.

Interesting too that examples of people born in the West Indies and Abyssinia (now Ethiopia) were to be found hereabouts as long as two hundred years ago and more.

recently visited the county village of Wanlip, where I discovered the grave of one Rassilas Morjan, who was born in Abyssinia who died at, the now demolished, Wanlip Hall in August 1839. His gravestone read that he had been "rescued from slavery". It is interesting that the anti-slaverv prominent campaigner, William Wil-



berforce often stayed at Wanlip Hall where Rassilas may have been in service as a free man. We know little of his life apart from the fact that: "...he died in his nineteenth year" and his tombstone

was raised "by one whom he loved".

Much of the work in drafting anti-slavery laws was done by William Wilberforce, Sir Thomas Babington and others at Rothley Court (now a hotel). Wilberforce led the Parliamentary anti-slavery campaign for twenty years until the passage of the 1807 Slave Trade Act.

Another man brought to Leicestershire as a slave was Edward Juba who went to work for Lord Wentworth at Kirkby Mallory before going on to do an apprenticeship as a ward comber in Peckleton. Huba was obviously hugely respected and became the first black Freeman in the City of Leicester. He also married a (white) city girl, Anne Mugglestone. Their descendants are, I understand still living six generations on, up in the north of the county.

It is difficult to know just how many men and women of African/Caribbean origin were living in the Leicester area in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries. Many found jobs in domestic service but others became quite entrepreneurial, including, for example, George Aficanus from Nottingham who set up his own Employment Agency Bureau.

It is interesting to reflect on what Rassilas from Wanlip might have gone on to achieve had he lived beyond his teenage years. Roger Blackmore

#### **BLACKBIRD ROAD WORKS**

Off peak lane closures are expected as the latest phase of a six year £19million traffic improvement scheme is underway.

Work has begun at the junction of Blackbird Road, Anstey Lane and Ravensbridge Drive, and also at the junction of Ravensbridge Drive, Abbey Gate and the A6 St Margaret's Way.

Costing £5million, this eiaht month lona stretch of the project will involve creating additional lanes to improve traffic flow at the junction of Black-Road. bird Anstev Lane and Ravensbridge Drive, as well as improving the layout and resurfacing work. It is designed to support the wider £240million redevelop-



ment of the city's Waterside area, where developers are creating hundreds of new homes, offices and workplaces.

Work is expected to stop over the Christmas period.

#### **NEW HOUSING RULES**

For those living in shared rented housing, a raft of new regulations are now in force which affects landlords and should benefit tenants.

New Government regulations governing the licensing of houses in multiple occupations (HMOs) came into force on 1st October and introduced new legal requirements for landlords and heavier penalties for failing to meet them.

An HMO is a property rented and occupied by five or more people from more than one family or household and where facilities, such as a bathroom or kitchen, are shared.

Landlords only required a licence if the property was three-storeys or more, this has now been extended to smaller properties. This means that landlords now need to apply for a licence for any HMO irrespective of its size.

The new legislation also requires that bedrooms in licensed HMOs are a minimum size and have a maximum number of occupants to prevent overcrowding. Landlords will be given up to 18 months to comply with the new space standards. The new legislation also requires landlords to ensure that HMOs have adequate waste disposal and storage facilities.

The council's private sector housing team will be responsible for carrying out inspections to ensure

standards are being met. Any landlord found failing to comply with the new rules could face a fine of up to  $\pounds 30,000$ .

Westcotes Councillor and assistant city mayor , with responsibility for housing, Andy Connelly, said: "We welcome this new law. It will help us tackle rogue landlords and deal more effectively with issues like overcrowding and safety in houses in multiple occupation.

"I am sure the stiffer penalties will also be welcomed by the vast majority of private landlords in the city who work hard to provide safe and decent properties for their tenants."

#### Mindfulness - Yoga for All All yoga should be 'mindfulness yoga'; mind-

fulness is living each part of each day with awareness, nonjudgmentally – being there in the moment. When we practice yoga that is what we are doing, we are working with asanas (yoga postures) with the breath and being there in that moment. We are in the body and we are with the breath. This has a cumulative effect which spreads into everyday living.

Yoga works mentally, physically and emotionally. Mentally it helps us to focus and concentrate, physically we stretch, strengthen, tone and relax the whole body, emotionally it helps to bring a balance of mind, body and breath.

I say to my students that if you practice yoga every day slowly with the breath for 15 minutes for 3 months it will change your life. This does not mean that you will not shout at those you love, it means you will shout a little less loudly and a little less often! #### Oct Police Update

Officers from the Fosse, Westcotes and New Parks wards assisted in a day of action on 24<sup>th</sup> September for Operation Sceptre which is the national policing strategy to combat knife crime and target those carrying knives. Numerous visits were made to known knife carriers, 2 persons were arrested and one found to be in possession of a knife which was taken off the streets.

Fosse Ward officers have secured a 3 month Anti-social behaviour closure order for an address on Kate Street which has been responsible for long term problems in the area. This is a great result and many thanks to local residents in the area who have assisted in providing information to the police.

Your local officers continue to fight the good fight against burglary! This includes numerous plain clothed, night time patrols. As nights draw in please consider how you can make your address look occupied. Can you put lights on a timer? Can neighbours assist by drawing your curtains if you are home late from work? Are your windows and doors in secure, working order?

Two men have been arrested and released, but remain under investigation, after separate collisions in the West Leicester; one of which took the life of a 57 year old mother of two.

Annette Booth was taken to the Queens Medical Centre on 29th of September but was pronounced dead following a collision in Woodgate. A 26 year old local man was arrested on suspicion of causing death by dangerous driving and being unfit to drive through drink or drugs.

In the other incident, also on 29th of September, Police were called after reports of an unconscious man lying in Narborough Road near Rowley Fields Avenue. The 52 year old was taken to University Hospitals of Coventry and Warwickshire where his condition was described as serious but not life threatening. A 25 year old Leicester man was arrested in connection with the incident.

#### Tony Huxley's Compost Corner

#### With many gardens now bereft of summer flowers or autumn colour it fools like we're in limbo between

it feels like we're in limbo between seasons. But recently I discovered the antithesis when I visited Picton Garden and nursery in Colwall, Malvern. This small but perfectly formed garden has much to recommend it all year, but it's in late summer and autumn when it really comes into its own.

of Michaelmas daisies, and is also where many of the modern-day varieties were developed. There are over 400 varieties within the garden!

Michaelmas daisies are members of the aster family with most originating from North America. They've been a stalwart of British gardens for hundreds of years. Unfortunately, many gardeners are put off by what they see as old-fashioned plants that succumb to mildew before they've started to flower. But they work well in modern planting schemes, combining with, and flowering at the same time as many ornamental grasses and other more fashionable perennials. There are plenty of mildew resistant varieties and they come in many different sizes, from compact varieties like "Alice Haslam" at no more than 30cm to "Purple Cloud" that can reach 180cm. They also come in a wide range of colours from white to purple via pinks, reds and blues, and in shades from delicate pastel to almost fluorescent.

Michaelmas daisies usually prefer a sunny position but most tolerate a wide range of soils. Being shallow rooted means they can be sensitive to drought, so apply a mulch if grown on well-drained soils. Making sure they don't suffer drought stress and allowing for a good air circulation around clumps will help reduce the risk of mildew. Divide clumps regularly to maintain vigour and stake taller varieties in exposed sites. Just a few tips will prevent disasters with asters. **Tony Huxley**
