Crows Nest Family Fun Day

The Crows Nest pub on Glenfield Road East became the centre of August Bank Holiday fun in West Leicester as over a thousand revellers turned up to enjoy the fun.



The free show, put on in aid of LOROS, included inflatable castles, face painting, cartoon characters and a visit from the Territorial Army Show run by The Royal Yeomanry B Squadron Leicester Division who let enthusiastic children clamber all over their armoured desert Land Rover and sit behind a heavy machine gun!



The Fun Day was organised by landlord Ray Cooper to raise money for LOROS who looked after his parents in their final months. He said: "It's been manic and we've not stopped all day. Everyone's mucked in - friends, staff and the community. We've tried to create a family atmosphere; somewhere where local people can take their kids, have fun and enjoy the Bank Holiday in the sun and I think we've done it. It's my way of saying thank you to all our customers."

When Ray and partner Yvette took over the Crows Nest four years ago they had an uphill battle to rescue the struggling pub with the worst reputation in West Leicester and turn it into a family friendly community pub.

They certainly succeeded over the August Bank Holiday weekend.

Emily Fortey

It is some seven years now since the Emily Fortey School merged with the former Piper Way School on Glenfield Road to form West Gate School. So it's time perhaps to ask: "Who actually was Emily Fortey?"

Born in London in 1866, the child of a relatively well to do family whose father was, for a time, working for the British Raj in India as Her Majesty's Inspector of Schools in Madras. She seems to have had a penchant for scholarship, first studying at Bristol University where she gained a BSc degree in 1895 then going on to read Sociology at the London School of Economics. Her studies also included training as a sanitary inspector as well as becoming a qualified midwife.

She first came to Leicester in 1909 and soon became actively involved in Labour politics. She was elected to the Board of Poor Law Guardians and later became a Vice President of the Leicester Temperance Society. During the First World War she undertook various forms of voluntary war work in France, including the supervision of a YMCA rescue home in Normandy.

In 1923 Emily Fortey gained election to the City Council for the St Margaret's Ward thereby be-


coming the first woman Labour Councillor ever to be elected in the city.

Her relationship with the Labour Group on the council was often controversial, however, not least when, as a committed Catholic, she fiercely opposed the promotion of birth control within the city. On at least one occasion she was strongly reprimanded by the Labour group for her stance.

Interestingly one of her great disappointments came over the issue of the employment by the city council of married women. Taking the view that jobs were hard enough to come by for men the council barred the employment of married women. In 1929 she worked hard to try and change the position to allow the employment of married women but the proposal was defeated. What rubbed salt into the wound was that at least one other woman councillor voted against her.

Emily Fortey was a somewhat unorthodox character. Her religious beliefs were very important to her and she was known to wear rather unusual outfits resembling a nun's habit.

This remarkable lady died in 1946 in her eightieth year. *Roger Blackmore*

I hate buses. I want to love them. I just can't. Every time I use a bus something goes hideously wrong.

After a recent stint on BBC Radio Leicester I tried to get a bus home. You might think going into my part of West Leicester from town would be easy at rush hour, buses every 10 minutes, all those bus lanes to use but no! I stood and waited for over 45 minutes as buses heading for every bit of the city but mine whizzed past. Finally one with the right number appeared but it had "out of service" in lights on the front, it was quickly followed by another. Our now sizeable queue of customers flagged this one down and the driver asked in amazement why we hadn't stopped the one in front. He did not seem surprised when we told him.

More recently I wanted to get into town in the evening. I had read up that the last bus went at 8.20pm and I dutifully stood there at 8.10pm waiting. The sign that used to tell you when the next

bus is coming, a great innovation - hasn't worked for a while now. I waited. By 8.40 nothing had turned up so I figured I'd missed it and ran to get my car, only to find the bus coming past at 8.50pm precisely. I gnashed my teeth in frustration.

These things could be written off as coincidence, bad luck or whatever but then I was in Oadby and saw the new Sapphire Bus from Arriva!

Dear Lord we are all being taken for mugs by the bus companies. Anyone who has sat on a normal bus should be clamouring loudly for an internet enabled Wi-Fi hub that allows you to pay for your trip on your mobile phone! These buses do not look smelly, they are clean and looked after and they seem to run with alarming regularity and with some fanfare. So why can Arriva do it for Oadby residents but not for the rest of us? Are we not worthy? Are we not rich enough? Are we not a prestige route? I fear the answer is yes and for now I shall keep using my car because the bus is never there when you need it.



STOP-CAMERA OR FINE!

Three West End red-light cameras have made it into the top ten of Leicester's most jumped traffic lights.

Woodville Road, Narborough Road/Fullhurst Avenue junction and Lubbersthorp Way caught 3177 drivers running red lights last year.

Sensors in the road only trigger the cameras when a vehicle crosses on the red, taking a picture of the car with the traffic lights in the background.

A fixed penalty fine is now £100, but that hasn't deterred the 4780 motorist who ran the red across the city's most profitable fixed camera on Soar Valley Way near Fosse Park.

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Theatre on Tap at The Western

There's a good chance you've seen Off the Fence Theatre Company in and around the city as they've produced performances at several iconic Leicester landmarks - the Market, the Castle, even the NCP on Halford Street.

The company is now creating a new and permanent performance space at another legendary building in the heart of the Westcotes community: The Western pub.

Whilst looking for rehearsal and performance space in 2012 Off the Fence's Artistic Director Gary Phillpott and Producer Verity Bartsch found the upstairs room at this popular local. A short run of *Godot Was Here* last October by Loughborough writer Thomas Scully signalled the birth of Upstairs at the Western, Leicester's first pub theatre. This was followed in March and April this year with a successful season of performances by local and touring companies featuring comedy, music, theatre and spoken word events. All of the acts performed on a unique stage built on beer kegs - what else?

Boosted by invaluable support from Westcotes Community First, O2 Think Bigger, Leicester City Council, a crowdfunding campaign and, crucially, The Western's brewery, Steam'n' Billy Brewery Company Limited, Off the Fence is now developing the space into a permanent venue. Building work is underway and performances are being programmed for their Autumn season beginning 16 October 2013.

Pub theatres have been in existence for hundreds of years and are a popular addition to a city's culture, particularly important for Leicester

as the city bids to be awarded UK City of Culture 2017. One of Off the Fence's core beliefs is to bring performance to new audiences and now, with Upstairs at the Western, opportunities to see established and emerging artists at affordable prices will be on tap - and practically on your doorstep.

A popular local and enjoyable theatre in the same building? Cheers!

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Kitted up For Success

A local youth soccer team scored a hit with the DeMontfort University's Mile2 Project following publicity in the Western Park Gazette.

Studs FC is a team of under 16 boys who approached the project looking to connect with the Mile2 programme for the start of the football season.

The side has had a turbulent couple of years, first losing their manager and also not being able to afford to have a proper full kit to play in; instead using a makeshift kit of hand-me-down home and away shirts.

Despite this the boys reached the semi-finals of the cup led by rookie manager Treena Hallam, a mum of one of the players, who was desperate to keep the squad together.

Treena approached Square Mile for help and it was agreed that this season Studs FC will be part of the Square Mile programme.

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September Police Update

The Smart View with Sgt Rod Smart

As the end of an excellent summer approaches and with darker nights closing in, you should consider setting lights on timers when you are out so that it appears to potential burglars that there is someone in the house.

Despite additional patrolling and a number of arrests, people are still becoming victims of theft when cyclists are riding up behind them and grabbing their mobile phone or laptop.

You are urged to be aware of your surroundings and who is around, keeping your valuable possessions out of the reach of others.

On 26 July two 11 year old boys were robbed of a cycle on The Rally Park. The bike has been successfully recovered and a 21 year old man and 17 year old youth have been charged with robbery and remanded in custody.

On 15 August, a house was burgled on Harrow Rd. A quick thinking member of the public witnessed the offence, telephoned the police and gave a commentary to our control room staff as she followed the offenders. Unfortunately, the offenders split up but she continued to follow one of them until he was detained by the police. Subsequently a 48 year old local man has been charged with burglary and remanded in custody.

On 16 August, a 75 old man accidentally dropped £200 cash after visiting the ATM machine at a bank on Narborough Rd. Two men immediately picked the money up and made off. The men were followed by an eye-witness who flagged down a passing police car and pointed out the offenders. A 28 year old city centre man has now been charged and remanded in custody for theft and a 26 year old local man has been charged and bailed to Court for receiving stolen goods.

On 19 August a house was burgled on Beaconsfield Rd and a ladder in the back garden was used to enter through an insecure upstairs window. Householders are reminded to secure away ladders and tools after using them in order to make life a little more difficult for criminals.

On 24 August, a 41 year old man from Battenberg Rd was charged with Perverting the Course of Justice and Witness Intimidation. He was remanded in custody following an incident that occurred earlier in the Tudor Rd area.

After leading the Hinckley Road policing area for some time, we are delighted to see Inspector Parkes move on to the role of Detective Inspector and welcome his replacement, Inspector Dales, who brings a wealth of experience to the area and our community.

Tony Huxley's Garden Tidings



We've finally had the long summer we've been waiting for. The dandelions in my lawn have decided it's spring again. Even though Autumn looms I had to abandon pruning a holly tree after discovering pairs of nesting blackbirds and doves.

The dry weather has checked the late summer flush I'd hoped the borders would produce. I've resorted to using a sprinkler early in the morning. Irrigation at dawn reduces the possibility of the sun scorching the leaves.



Watering in the evening increases the chance of waking hordes of hungry slugs and snails that long for cool, damp Autumn nights to lubricate their munching march across my borders. Or is that just gardeners paranoia?

You can't turn your back on fruit and veg this time of year. A family member told me he forgot to pick his courgettes for a fortnight by which time the fruit was too big for him to lift! Unless you want just a couple of massive flavourless marrows make sure

you pick courgettes regularly. The more you pick the more you get. The same goes for other edibles like runner beans or even inedibles like sweet peas that reward you for filing vases with blooms by flowering even harder.

Tomatoes can't be ignored either. Water and feed regularly to avoid split fruit and blossom end rot. Regular watering will also help prevent brassicas and salad crops from running to seed.

Now is the time to catch many pests before they wriggle off and hibernate in their pupa till next year. Lily beetles, cabbage whites and sawfly larva can be located by their obvious trail of destruction. This year a varied selection of moth caterpillars are be chewing holes in a multitude of my low growing perennials. Maybe we can all rest when Autumn finally arrives-then again... *Tony Huxley*




Sweet Pea
