Police took away thousands of cannabis plants and piles of growing equipment from The Huntsman's Rest, better known as the Blue Moon pub on Carlisle Street.



Police acting on information made the discovery in the closed down pub on June 19th and began removing the plants and equipment in flat bed lorries the following day.

Residents of Carlisle Street and Bolton Road were stunned that a huge cannabis farm had mously or the police on 0116 222 2222, especialbeen set up right on their doorstep. Dave Barratt who works next to the Blue Moon said: "We had recently.

when the police started taking the stuff away in the morning." Jim Smyth who lives opposite said: "I didn't notice anything unusual at all. Its amazing this could be right in front of us and nobody saw a thina."

Police also took away dozens of arow bags. gallons of plant liahts. food. wiring and humidifying equipment. A large panel wooden



covered in plugs and adapters was also spotted being removed.

The cannabis plants and growing equipment has been sent for analysis and investigations are continuing, but nobody has been arrested, so far, in connection with the discovery.

A police spokeswoman said: "We're delighted such a huge haul of Class C drugs has been taken off the streets." She also urged anybody who has any information to call Crimestoppers anonyly if they have seen suspicious activity in the area

Former Lord Mayor, Roger Blackmore, is a huge fan of Irish Country Music so he's just the man to tell us about the Leicester's connection to one of Ireland's most famous popular songwriters.

Galway Bay to Leicester Via John Wayne

Having a lifelong love of Irish Country Music I find that many Irish visitors to Leicester (and indeed more than a few Leicester residents of Irish extraction) are amazed to discover that one of the Emerald Isles most famous tunesmiths actually spent much of his life and did most of his composing in Leicester.

Arthur Colahan was born in 1885 in Enniskillen, before moving to Galway where he grew up.

He was awarded an arts degree at University College Dublin, before studying medicine and graduating in 1913. He was very active in the University debating and musical societies where his talent for composing



first became apparent. He began his medical career in Galway before serving in India during the First World War. During his time with the British Army Medical Corps, he was badly effected by mustard gas.

By the 1920,s Colahan was working as a psychiatrist and consultant neurologist in Leicester's Welford Road Prison and living in Prebend Street just off the London Road, close to the railway station. (I was told at one stage that he was an eye surgeon at the Royal Infirmary and would be interested to know if this is true?)

In his leisure time he turned to musical composition, writing many Irish songs, including "Cade Ring" and "Macushla Mine". Most famous of all his songs, however, was "Galway Bay", full of nostalgia for the county of his birth and written as a tribute to one of his brothers who drowned there. Bing Crosby recorded the song which added to its already world wide popularity, becoming the biggest selling record of all time at one stage. The song also features in the classic John Wayne film 'The Quiet Man' but Colahan is not credited as the composer.

Arthur Colahan died at his home in Prebend Street on September 9th 1952, where a blue plaque commemorates his life.

He was buried in Galway - where else?

Organisers are considering another Open Gardens Event in 2013: "But we'll need at least 20 gardens and community support for it to succeed." said Pat.

Landlord Ray Cooper said: "It was amazing! It's going to hard to beat, but next year's will be bigger, bolder and even better with more prize money - Over 200 people entered and we'll beat that next year."

ST. ANNE'S MEMORIAL WINDOW

A new Parish Memorial Window commemorating those parishioners who lost their lives on active service has been unveiled at St. Anne's Church during a special Ascension Day Service.

In 2009, a small group inspired by nonagenarian Doreen Butterworth, who lost her navigator husband over France during the Second World War. started work on the idea of a stained glass window. With the help of local glass artist Claire Williamsupport from son. local people and the Art Department at



New College, a unique design was eventually created.

The window incorporates various medals and their ribbons to reflect not just past conflicts, but to also include those who lost their lives during non military service to this country.

The window was finally fitted on May 31st, just two days ahead of the unveiling.

At the service of dedication, Doreen Butterworth spoke eloquently of her personal loss and said that whilst generations know nothing of the losses incurred during World War II, life has moved on, as it should, but now there are new wars, new struggles for freedom, precious lives are being shattered and lost.

Michael Walker, who was one of the movers behind the project said: "Now there's special place where we can pause and remember; special for all those who pray for world peace whilst remembering those who gave their tomorrow for our today".





Dovelands Feted for Success

Dovelands School on Hinckley Rd held another highly successful Open Day and Fete to raise money for playground development, library books, and theatre workshops.

Hundreds turned up on July 2nd to enjoy the many traditional stalls and activities which also included the ever popular Sponge the Teacher! Parents and staff meet though the year to plan the event and parents donate the prizes.

Nice Box - What's in it? Richard Perry

With the smoking demise of my trusty PC and its wonderful XP operating system, I have been forced to buy a new one. And of course it runs on Window 7. It's a very clever bit of software, but I hate it because stuff is in different places, so I have to learn where it all is and I don't want to.

Nevertheless, the best of the best had to be loaded, but I'm tight and don't want to pay for software, so I go for the freebies.



First up – Anti Virus software. This time I

gave the premier freebie, AVG, a miss and went for **Avast!** A nice and simple antivirus programme which seems to be better than the last time I used it. Very simple interface which keeps a watchful eye on the computers innards.

Next up, some anti-malware in the form of **Malwarebytes.** This is a great little programme that roots out any nasties that have managed to sneak past the antivirus; and they do - you can't stop all of them. If you think your PC has a malware infection, like pop-ups or unwanted programmes appearing out of nowhere, run this programme and will stamp on it's face until it goes away. It is a must have.

Most PC's come ready fitted with the Windows Media Player, but I prefer the VLC version. Admittedly its not pretty, there are no visualisations or swirly patterns to gawp at, but it will play almost anything; music and video files or DVD's with the exception of BluRay discs. It's also available for Mac users and it outstrips most bought media players for features.

If you like fiddling with pictures and you don't fancy buying Photoshop, then **Paint.net** is the answer. It is full of useful tools, but it can be a bit of a learning curve for a novice. It's not a professional package, but like the others, it's free and that counts for a lot. You could move up one with **GIMP**, which aims to be the free equivalent of Photoshop and almost manages it, but you need time and the instruction book to get used of it.

Residents of Woodgate are objecting to an application by the local shisha café to extend it's alcohol licence, opening hours and have a music licence.

People living in and around Frog Island are up in arms over the proposals which could mean the Moon Shisha Lounge on Woodgate selling alcohol half an hour later until 11.30pm and increased noise.

The café which used to be the Old Robin Hood pub has already been checked by the council's planning officers and noise teams, following complaints of loud music.

The café has planning permission for an outdoor smoking area on the condition that it is not used after 11.00pm and is music free.

Council officers, have gathered evidence of a breach in planning permission and noise nuisance and will present their objections at the licencing hearing on July 19th.

In response, the café's owner has promised to create a designated taxi area and to remind patrons to be quiet as they leave.

squaring the circle

Tony Huxley's Garden Tidings



It's now time for a summer prune to encourage spring flowering shrubs to bloom well next year. This includes plants such as *Forsythia*, *Ribes* (flowering currant), *Weigela* and early flowering *Viburnum* like x *bodnantense*. Cut back up to a third of older stems to ground level to encourage new growth. To maintain size reduce overall

height by around a third. Afterwards mulch with compost or a handful of slow release fertilizer. Treat *Kerria* the same but dig out unwanted stems to restrict spread.

It is also the time to give *Wisteria* another haircut. I loosely follow the 2 and 6 rule. In Feb, the 2nd month, cut back all shoots from a main stem



to 2 buds. In the 6nd month-June, cut back all side shoots to 6 buds. They really benefit from a hard prune so don't be precious. Limit the amount of

shoots you let grow from ground level allowing none to come from below the graft or you may find a poor or none flowering rootstock taking over. Resist applying fertilizer, this often encourages the plant to produce masses of unwanted greenery.

While in pruning mode, I discovered a Damson in distress! It was overgrown and in danger of pushing our garden wall over!

Luckily it's also a good time to prune deciduous members of the *prunus* family, i.e. cherries, plums. If growing for fruit you may want to wait till harvesting is completed, but try to prune before summer's end to reduce the risk of silver leaf spores infecting the cuts. *Punus* trees, my damson



included, often produce lots of shallow roots that lead to a thicket of suckers, so think carefully before planting close to lawn or paving. The best remedy is to dig the offending root out before it gets too big. Happy hacking!
