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
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ELECTION EDUCATION

I had no bag, so holding on tight to the bottle neck, I walked with some trepidation through the smoke grey mist. Just inside our garden gate, my feet went from under me, sending the bottle flying.

The West End was a very different place back then. Far more industrial, fewer cars, bleaker, with none of the wonderful diversity that has enriched the area we know today. There was far less of what we know today as consumerism and many families, including my own, used to save all year around, for the festive season. 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HOMECOMING 1910

Many kinds of events throughout the city were carried out to mark the Homecoming in the last week of September 1910.

The celebration of the return of some 300 Leicestrians to their home city was not only the first event of its kind to take place in Leicester, it was the first of its kind in Great Britain. Initially the organisers of the event were unsure as to the likely numbers who would return to Leicester for the event. They were delighted when folk began to arrive from all over the world.

From Canada and New Zealand they came; from the United States and Australia and from distant parts of the Commonwealth in Africa and Asia, they were all returning to the place that had once been their home. Emigration was a factor even in those days. For example, one former mayor, the boot and shoe manufacturer George Green, had seven sons, four of whom had emigrated to New Zealand.

No doubt with advice from other countries including The United States, where such events were popular, programmes of events was drawn up including a civic reception by the mayor, a popular fancy dress parade and visits to local factories and businesses including Corahs and British United Shoe Machinery and several other hosiery and boot and shoe companies.

The Leicester Automobile Club laid on a highly popular tour of Charnwood Forest which brought back fond memories for many of the visitors. So many spots like the Bradgate House ruins, Swithland Woods and Beacon Hill were memorable and participants were delighted that so much of the countryside was unspoilt and not built on.



It is interesting that such environmental concerns were being voiced nearly110 years ago.

The tour of the city tramway system was an eye opener to so many who remembered the horse drawn transport of their childhood in the city and its suburbs

The city fathers were especially keen to show off Abbey Park in which a big Homecoming welcome reception had been arranged. Many visitors remembered the area as a boggy strip of land by the river and must have marvelled at the transformation which had taken place.

And thus they departed after renewing friends and acquaintances in the city they had once known so well. **Roger Blackmore**

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Dec Police Update

This time of year signals an array of festivities and your teams have been actively engaging in these community activities, so a big thank you to all those event organisers who support the beat teams. In addition, we are in the middle of a campaign of targeting drug dens, actively pursuing those wanted on warrant and visiting those people whom we suspect to habitually carry knives. We have increased efforts to educate children and young people around knife crime through our schools campaign.

As the temperatures drop, please be a good neighbour to those who are elderly or with vulnerabilities. Loneliness impacts upon people's wellbeing and just being a friendly face can mean a lot. Be vigilant and always report suspicious activity. I mention this, as neighbouring beats have witnessed several distraction type burglaries where the assailants pretend to be from the water/gas companies and plain clothed police officers. Always ask for Identification and leave them on the doorstep until you've checked out their credentials. No genuine caller would ever object to this.

My advice is not to chance it and stick to non-alcoholic drinks if you intend to drive. Remember, you can still be over the limit the following day if you drank heavily the night before. We have a zero tolerance for drunk-driving and you are unlikely to receive a sympathetic ear if you are caught.

Catalytic Convertor thefts are on the rise with some brazen criminals using trolley lifts to gain access to the underside of vehicles. Avoid being a victim by parking your car in a locked garage or in a well-lit area with the exhaust being close to fences, walls or a kerb making access more difficult. Avoid parking your vehicle half on the pavement and half on the road, as this may make it access easier for thieves. Consider buying catalytic converter alarms or metal cages, which can be fitted to act as a deterrent. If your catalytic converter is bolted on, you can ask your local garage to weld the bolts to make it more difficult to remove. Marking kits for catalytic converters can also help police identify them at scrap yards or on suspect vehicles We are looking to increase the use of neighbourhood link, a police community messaging service where we will send you the latest news updates and events direct from us. Registration is free and you can join by going to the web page www.neighbourhoodlink.co.uk. Finally, we are supporting the alternative advent run by the Salvation Army. Food parcels, however big or small can be dropped off at Hinckley Road Police Station, which will be distributed to people and families in need. Be safe and see you next year.

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




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
