

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

Cast your minds back just over two years. Leicester City Council had just announced the successful bidders for the redevelopment of the dilapidated buildings and otherwise brownfield land on

the Hinckley Road edge of Western Park. At that time, you may have heard about plans to bring the former Eco House back into public use as a space for the community. That was us. Ready and raring to go, an eager team of volunteers from the local area. Small business owners, teachers, healthcare professionals, local councillors, shop workers, mums, dads. The Western Ward Community Enterprise (or WWCE for short).



Nature is slowly reclaiming the land and frequent acts of vandalism are taking their toll on the structure itself. In truth, while we have waited for the formal exchange of contracts, we have all felt frustration and learnt that the cogs of the council machine can often move very slowly, but things are moving forward. You may have enjoyed one of our community events, rolled a pumpkin with us in the park or seen our stand at the West-

ern Park Festival. We have been talking to lots of you about what you want from the building and how it can bring our community together.

Project Hive will officially start in the spring. We will be entering an exciting new chapter in the redevelopment when we launch the first phase of crowdfunding with a series of exciting community events which we are busy planning at the moment. We really hope that we can count on your support for this crucial stage of the project, the first proper step in getting the space back into use. There are also plans afoot to get out there and talk to even more local residents and community groups about our plans and how they can help in more detail.

There will be regular updates on what's going on with Project Hive both here in the Gazette and through our social media channels. Our website is in the process of being overhauled, and will be relaunched soon.

Do you want to make a positive and lasting difference in the place you live? Can you spare a little time on a regular basis? We are hoping to recruit more people who, like us, are ready to get stuck in and drive this project forward. 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Building on Change

In Norwich recently I visited the Bridewell city museum. This was a former women's prison and it reminded me how many historic buildings have changed use, often several times, in our own city.

A good example in West Leicester is the former Braunstone Hall, once a family mansion, then a school, now, after standing derelict for twenty years, transformed into a boutique hotel and restaurant. It is a fact too that our City Museum and Art Gallery on New Walk also started life as a school, as did the nearby Belmont Hotel

Many of Leicester's former factories and industrial workshops have obviously fallen out of use for their original purpose. Thus a former suitcase factory has taken on a new life, somewhat appropriately, as The Case Restaurant, whilst a knitwear factory in Highcross Street is now the Cosy Club bar and restaurant. Indeed inside it still resembles a hosiery factory, maintaining many of the features. Another hosiery factory that underwent drastic renovation following years of neglect was the Fiveways factory on Tudor Road; now student accommodation.

Wygston's House, formerly Wyggeston House, on Jubilee Square has gone through various changes of use in the last 400 years, including a period as a Costume Museum, recently opening up as a bar and restaurant.

Another historic range of buildings make up the former Trinity Hospital which was purchased by De Montfort University for use as exhibition space and the Vice Chancellor's residence. This was a major

addition to the University's campus, whilst the Hospital was relocated a few yards away on a site adjacent to the River Soar, providing a much more modern home for the elderly residents.

Those looking for the Empire Hotel at the bottom of Newfoundpool will find a Lidl supermarket in its place, whilst several redundant churches have



been converted into residential apartments.

And of course, visitors from all over the world visit the renowned Richard the Third Visitor Centre, housed in what was once part of Alderman Newton's School.

Gazette Readers will be able to think of many other examples of such changes throughout the city. Roger Blackmore

A Newfoundpool hairdresser who put down her scissors and picked up a paintbrush has just had her work accepted for a prestigious city art exhibition.





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Dec Police Update

Your local priorities for the West Leicester Neighbourhood Policing are to prevent knife crime, to tackle the use and supply of drugs by organised criminals and to reduce instances of burglary and car crime. I am pleased to say that we have had some great results over the past month in relation to all of these priorities!

We complete weekly dedicated patrols across the area specifically targeting those believed to be carrying knives. One such patrol on Noel Street led to a large hunting knife being seized and the carrier being charged with an offence. We shall continue this work and look for your support in identifying those who you believe carry knives in public.

The Westcotes beat team have closed down a number of cannabis in the West End during the last month taking well over £100,000 worth of drugs out of the hand of serious organised criminals. Their work has also protected two streets in the area from the fire risk of living close to such factories! Please continue to report your suspicions by telephoning 101 or Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111

In the past few days the Fosse Ward team have arrested two people trying to get away having just broken into a car on King Richards Road. This means two prolific criminals are now off the streets! Please remove all your valuables from your car when unattended as we try to reduce this crime.

We have now moved to a new police station on our own existing site on the corner of Hinckley Road and Norfolk Street. Our front office is open 10am-4pm Monday to Friday as usual and the same local policing teams covering the Westcotes, Fosse and New Parks are based here.

Finally congratulations to PC 557 Matt Eld who this year won the much coveted Leicestershire Police 'Beat Bobby of The Year' award. This is suitable reward for Matt's consistent excellent work and dedication to the community of the Westcotes Ward. Well done Matt! The Westcotes neighbourhood policing team were also highly commended in the beat team of the year award so again well done to Sergeant Spencer Dyer and team!

As we approach the Christmas period please think of your local policing team who work throughout the holiday period so that you and your community are kept safe over Christmas.

Tony Huxley's Compost Corner

Lets not call them Christmas wreaths; its so depressing. Garlands is a much less funereal way of describing these traditional seasonal decorations.

Having scoped them out on EBay and Amazon; not to mention a few garden centres, the price can vary from a few pounds to over two hundred. Why someone would spend that much? They can't be that difficult to make. can they?

Yes they can... Especially if you want to go hard-core and upmarket. To do this you will have to forage and scavenge bits at farm shops or florists and a have the knack for craft work, which I don't. If I did, this is how I would make a Christmas garland.

Step 1: Get a fistful of bendy flexible, stripped branches from, say, a weeping willow and weave them together into a circle of about 18 inches across to make the base or, for the simple life, just buy a wire frame from a florist or garden centre.

Step 2: Tightly wrap the circle with moss, binding it with wire but leave enough to bend into a hoop to use as a hanger. The hoop is the top of the design. Step 3: Attach a plastic wrap to protect the back by folding together and securing with U pins. Step 4: Select your decorative evergreen foliage.

There's lots to choose from like Spruce, Cedar and Cyprus. Bunch them together into fans with the larger pieces at the back and repeat until there's enough to cover the base.

Step 5: secure and overlay the bunches to the base with wire making sure the greenery covers the wire. Alternatively use smaller pieces and poke them into the moss, bend back and repeat until the base is covered.

Step 5: Indulge your inner decorator. For the traditional look wire in pine cones, holly berries, rosehips, old man's beard or artificial decorations. Other options could include dried oranges, apples or cinnamon sticks for that yuletide sparkle... Simple!?

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
