The main story this month is of the Council's determination to stamp out the swathes of unedifying graffiti that's splashed across the West End and other areas of Leicester. There's a particular horrifying example at the old Empire pub.

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£500 Anti Graffiti Reward

Graffiti vandals have scrawled 2500 tags across Leicester and the city council badly wants to catch those responsible.

In October, the Square Mile Project cleaned up graffiti that had appeared across business fronts and street furniture in Woodgate but shortly afterwards, the nearby former Empire pub on Fosse Road North was defaced with spray paint.



The city's clean up bill could hit £200,000 by the end of the summer. The problem is so serious that the council has taken the unusual step of offering £500 reward leading to the successful conviction of the graffiti vandals.

The council has repeatedly mounted operations targeting the prolific taggers "Kase" which appeared in Woodgate and "SO.12" but, when as many as 100 examples appeared overnight, this proved difficult.

It's thought the taggers are in gangs, rather than individuals, but the council hope that the public will come forward with information to stop, what has been described, as "an onslaught" and secure successful convictions of those responsible.

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Leicester's Water God!

Earlier this month I visited Swithland Reservoir on a bright and sunny New Years Day, enjoying the sight of the Great Central trains steaming away across the water. As I watched, I reflected on how the work of Victorian engineers, in catering for the need for clean and fresh drinking water, had also led to the creation of some beautiful landscapes.

As the population of the City of Leicester grew throughout the nineteenth century, one of the key issues to be faced was the need for clean water and decent sanitation.

As a result there were furious discussions, both within the city council and beyond, about the best ways of meeting these needs.

Luckily for Leicester, Thomas Hawksley was born in 1807 and went on to become one of the greatest water and sanitary engineer of the Victorian Age. His services were to be called upon by towns and cities up and down the land and his association with our city began around 1845.

There were initially fierce arguments between Hawksley and others about the feasibility of piping water from reservoirs some distance away from the city. In the end, Hawksley's view that such schemes were possible won and in the 1850's he successfully developed Thornton Reservoir some eight miles from Leicester.

Interestingly, the first piped water supply to be connected in the city was to the Temperance Hall!



A succession of very dry summers in the early 1860's led Hawksley to push for a new source of supply. His preference was for what was initially called the Bradgate Site, which we now know as Cropston Reservoir. This new work, opened in 1868, was to add 500 million gallons to the existing water supply. Yet the demand for water continued at such a rate that not only was the capacity at Thornton and Cropston increased but plans were later developed to construct a new reservoir between Swithland and Quorn.

Thomas Hawksley himself went on to become President of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers and died in London in 1893 at the age of eighty six. Leicester, and many other cities, owe him a great deal. *Roger Blackmore*

Tony Huxley's Garden Tidings



Our feather brained gardener has got himself into a flap this month after a close tweet from avian flu. It was quite a birden!

Encouraging nature into the garden, especially this time of year, can be a great entertainment. And bird watching from the kitchen window can be far more interesting and rewarding than staring at the usual drivel on the TV!

As food in their natural habitats

dwindles, migratory and rural birds may visit our homes in search of a meal. This can have practical benefits. Birds are an excellent natural pest control. Any pest disposed of during the winter could save your plants from hundreds of their hungry leaf munching offspring in the spring.

Fat-balls and feeders hung in trees will encourage the flocks of tits that gang together in winter. They also love to peck all the hibernating aphid eggs and troublesome grubs from your fruit tree bark.

Old windfall apples will attract blackbirds and thrushes. Apple cores and over ripe fruit you wish to add will also be appreciated. They'll also scour

the leaf litter for tasty morsels like slugs, snails and cutworms. If you're lucky fieldfares may join in. Leaving the seed heads on herbaceous plants will encourage finches. Try not to prune berry bearing plants and hedges till early spring, as well as ivy, which is a larder of bugs for tits and sparrows.

In cat infested areas, place bird tables in open sites, then birds



can see the pesky felines coming. Feed regularly during the winter then birds will make a habit of visiting your garden. Wasting energy on a fruitless trip can prove fatal when food is scarce. With a little luck you may encounter less common visitors such as woodpeckers, nuthatches and goldcrests. Your new guests maybe a tempting sight for a sparrowhawk. It may prove a shocking spectacle but it's a million times more dramatic than watching your neighbour's fat moggy doing the same-or watching EastEnders!

January Police Update

The Smart View with Sgt Rod Smart
I am pleased to report that we have seen a
reduction in burglaries since Christmas
but residents are still reminded to take precautions and be vigilant. It is important to
ensure that doors and windows are securely
locked, along with alley and garden gates. If
you are out during the evening it is a good
idea to leave a security light on a timer to give
the impression that someone is in. Security
marking or registering valuables such as laptops, TVs and mobile phones for free on
www.immobilise.com will assist us to return
recovered property to victims.

If you have a smart phone you can also download a 'find my phone' app. This will help to track your phone in the unfortunate event that it is stolen. This really paid off for a victim of burglary in the Tudor Road area in December. As a result of the victim having a 'find my phone' app on his mobile phone, a search warrant was executed at a nearby address. A 22-year-old local man has since been charged with this offence and another burglary which happened in the area on an earlier date.

Any local residents interested in crime prevention advice or wishing to report anything suspicious can contact their safer neighbourhood team on 101 or via 999 in an emergency.

Just before Christmas a vigilant local resident called the police after spotting a man siphoning fuel from a van parked at a business on Fosse Road North. Thanks to the quick thinking resident, a 42-year-old man has since been charged with theft.

There was no happy start to the New Year in West Leicester for three local businesses as burglars raided their premises, causing thousands in damage and making off with a large amount of cash.

NEW YEAR BURGLARIES

At around 6am on the 2nd of January thieves ransacked, Angels Gentlemen's Club, the Music Café bar and the Vinee Spice Restaurant.



Restaurant owner Vinee Singh of Vinee Spice restaurant in New Park Street, off Braunstone Gate, had left the cash in the restaurant as he did not want to carry it home when he finished work in the early hours of the morning. Mr Vinee said he started his business from nothing three years ago and had worked very hard to build it up there were no words to describe how he felt.

The restaurant's CCTV showed two hooded men carrying a metal pole or hammer smashing tills and fridges; stealing up to £6,000 in cash and taking bottles of spirits. The pair then broke into an adjoining gentlemen's club, Angels, followed by the Music Cafe Bar.

Anthony Overend, who owns and opened the Music Café bar 18 months ago, was the first to discover the shared building had been burgled when he arrived at his property and found tills, gaming machines and a pool table had been emptied.

Burglars made off with about £500 in cash but caused more than £1,000 of damage to the café bar.

Anyone who saw any suspicious activity in the area at the time is asked to call 101.

More and more people are being contacted by scammers offering to save their computer from a nasty virus. Peter Coley says - don't get take in!



If you have a phone then you probably will have had calls from people offering you help to claim something, get something or trying to sell you something. Most are just trying to generate business and are often irritating but not usually criminal.

Occasionally you may get a call from people who are out to cheat you and here is one international scam which catches many people and can cost a lot of money.

Windows Virus Scam

It works like this: You receive a call, usually from a man, claiming to be from Microsoft or your windows company who will say they are calling you because of all the viruses on your computer.

They will claim your computer has notified them that it is infected. They will then try and persuade you to search for error messages on your computer (in the



event viewer), falsely claiming these are caused by dangerous viruses which must be removed.


Next they will direct you to their web site on the internet and try to persuade you to let them take control of your computer and purchase very expensive and completely BOGUS software to" fix" the alleged problem. Their software does not fix anything but will actually install a Trojan virus giving the criminals the ability to monitor for any bank details, contact lists etc. that you may store on the machine. They will also have your card details!!

For clarification Microsoft say "Microsoft will never cold call users asking for personal information or access to your PC. Whenever possible these calls should be reported to your local consumer protection agency".

It is believed these criminals operate from India, they sound plausible and can be quite insistent but don't be taken in. Tell them you do not have a computer or just put the phone down as they are trying to steal from you!
