



## **CITY OF MANSIONS**

Many readers will be delighted that Braunstone Hall, having been left near derelict for so many years, has at last gained a new lease of life as a restaurant, hotel and wedding venue.

Originally completed in 1776, designed and built by Leicester architect William Oldman, the building has now been re-named Winstanley House. This was name of the family that lived there for so many years, before the hall and park were compulsorily purchased by the City Council in 1925.

The hall is only one of the impressive big houses situated in various parts of the city, each of which was at one time a posh private residence.



Well known to many is Belgrave Hall in the north of the city. This was built in the reign of Queen


Anne by a member of the Craddock family. It is, of course today, one of the City's most popular museums. In recent years it has acted as host to a whole variety of cultural activities.

Knighton Hall in the south of the city is an early eighteenth century building, close to the heart of the leafy suburb of Knighton. It serves today as the official residence of the Vice Chancellor of Leicester University. It was also lived in for a time by another of the Craddock family - hence the name of the pub (The Craddock Arms) which stands near the gates to the Hall.

Evington Hall was built by Henry Coleman between 1840 and 1845. After becoming a private residence it went through various incarnations as a convent and a school. Interestingly at the time of the Spanish Civil War in the 1930's it was, for a while, to become a home for Basque refugee children. Some of these children, now in their 80's, indeed re-visited their old home when they returned to Leicester for a nostalgic journey. They found the city much changed!

Thus each of these former splendid city residences have each gone on to find widely different uses in later years. Each has gone through periods of doubt and uncertainty about its future but each has now thankfully found a new role.

## **UPSTAIRS @ THE WESTERN**

A year ago Upstairs at The Western had a change of management. The old guard 'Off The Fence' moved on to other things and David Bell and his team stepped in to take over running the venue. I met up with David to see how he thought the first 12

months had gone.

He said: "We were told we'd taken over the theatre after the end of October 2016, so we had two months basically to get ready for the spring 2017 season. Because Off The Fence knew they were leaving they hadn't booked anything. So, we had a manic run around to try find touring companies at the last minute. Thankfully we inherited peo-



ple like Jess Green for Find The Right Words. I think in our first six months we managed to get about 25 shows and by and large they weren't too bad. Artistically, there were a couple in there that probably weren't as good as we'd hoped but on the whole we managed to attract quality shows from the off."

**Paul Towers**: The first season was quite heavy on spoken words and poetry because it was easy to book in at short notice?

David Bell: I think our first season was a bit of a

scramble, we didn't really get to the printers with a good brochure because we didn't have time. So we just had to get a pamphlet. It was just really getting used to running the business and all the behind the scene stuff, but I think, yeah, it's got a lot easier. Autumn '17 has been a lot easier.

**PT:** There was a very broad line-up in autumn. Was it deliberate - trying to cater for everybody or is it a question of working out what brings the punters in? **DB:** Off The Fence were a larger drama-based (production) company who created their own shows and toured with them. But our bid was all about turning Upstairs at The Western into a multi-genre arts venue for the West End of Leicester. So it's a case of widening the genres, branching out more into music, comedy, a bit more poetry, film, those kind of things, but also increasing the volume. So the previous owners did about 50 shows a year and our business plan aims for about 150 shows a year. Because we are closed in July and August, that's about fifteen a month or three a week.

We're widening the type of shows we're doing. The type of thing we've gotten here is a lot broader than it has been before, but we are expanding it in what can be a crowded marketplaces. There is loads of comedy coming in. We're coming back big time in the Leicester Comedy Festival this year.

## A PAIN IN THE NECK?

## Jan Police Update

The Christmas and New Year period across West Leicester was the usual mix. During the build up to the 25th there were a number of sporadic burglaries targeting presents left out on view. Overall the trend of fewer reported burglaries has continued, especially in the West End areas so please remain vigilant and help to prevent crime by continuing to close and lock side gates, windows and doors and use timers for lighting if leaving your premises unattended for any longer periods of time.

There has been a continued flow of reports of theft from motor vehicles on the Westcotes and Fosse areas which have included some trades vans being targeted for tools. Please remove any valuables you can overnight, including where possible tools.

'Operation Items' which was a Police knife crime initiative run across the New Parks area, concluded in December. This saw a number of individuals arrested for carrying offensive weapons and the removal from the streets of a large number of knives.
