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Our World Cup Goal!

As England gears up for the World Cup in Brazil, one west Leicester man is hoping his part in a football anthem could help spur on England's chances and push a band of local musicians to a chart hit.

John Sinclair (Pictured right on front page), well known to Leicester's radio listeners as a sports commentator has lent his voice to 'A Love as Big as England' by Leicester four piece rockers Ferris. John, who is also a huge local music fan and promoter, said: "I got to know Ferris through my radio work and they asked me to mock up a football commentary. I've reported on lots of matches and play Fifa a lot but I still had to do four or five different takes to fit with the music; I managed to adlib when we performed it live at the 02 Academy."

Scott Grocock and Rob Bourgault formed Ferris three years ago following an acoustic gig at the Looking Glass in Braunstone Gate, recruiting the other two members Cam Favell and Nik Wale before hitting the gigging circuit with their unique brand of rock n' roll and indi.

Both Scott and Bob are long standing England and Leicester City FC fans. Scott said: "We mostly play all our own original material in London and a

lot of festivals. On the way back from a gig, I had this tune in my head so me and Bob decided to write a cult World Cup football song for England but not deviate from what Ferris is all about."



'A Love as Big as England' has already sparked a lot of interest and thousands of listens on SoundCloud as Rob Bourgault explained: "We've been on the front of the Mercury; featured in the Sunday People even Louis Walsh backed us against Gary Barlow! The celebrities are on the case: Steven Gerrard re-tweeted us and we've appeared on Gabby Roslin's BBC Radio London show. And there's a nation radio plugging campaign on the go"

The single was released on iTunes and other download sites on 9^{th} of June.

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Leicester's Great War

With the hundredth anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War looming later this year, much has been prepared on both radio and television to mark this occasion.

This was a war which touched upon the lives of virtually every family in the land. When I started work at Imperial Typewriters on East Park Road in 1964 the Stores Foreman, Arthur Price, had actually served in the trenches during the conflict. Although he only spoke occasionally of his experiences, I can still well remember some of his descriptions of the battleground, realising how young he must have been when he first went off to war. I also still have a trio of letters, written to my grandfather from the front, from three of his erstwhile workmates, which miraculously managed to pass the censor's gaze. My mother had fond memories of her brother Arthur going off to war when she was six years old. He was killed near Ypres in 1917. A year earlier my father-in-law had lost his father in battle near Amiens. My grandma's Leicester born cousin Tom Lewin returned from the war, like many others, battered and bruised. He struggled on, sometimes working for a month or two, sometimes spending time off Welford

Road in what was then known as the lunatic asylum. Four years after the end of the war he was dead. Every family contained within it memories of a similar kind.



Leicester is however unique, almost certainly in England, possibly in the world, in deciding at the end of the war to endow a University in memory of the fallen. From small beginnings announced on Armistice Day, that determination has blossomed into the University of Leicester we know today. The University's motto: "Ut Vitam Habeant" ("So that they may have life") represents the sacrifice of those who served and died in the Great War. Roger Blackmore



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


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KNOTT'S LANDING

Smashing into a tree at 30mph so it breaks your bones, splits your skull and damages your body beyond repair is hilarious isn't it? It's even funnier when you break your mate's bones.

I was already angry but

what really made me seethe was the following day when an entire family seemed to think it was OK to ride motorbikes and quads on the park without helmets. They also seemed to think it was fine for a child to do it. Oh yes because children's skulls are soooo much harder than adults when they hit a tree or the bike rolls onto them they won't end up with brain damage at all! In my opinion people who allow kids to ride motorised vehicles without proper safety equipment should be prosecuted and their children removed to foster care for their own safety.

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Are you a male

diabetic using insulin?

Male type 2 diabetics who use insulin are being invited to take part in an exercise study that will deliver health benefits while contributing to world-class research.

De Montfort University is hoping to recruit volunteers in a project which looks at how exercise impacts on diabetes. The study will go towards the long-term aim of creating an artificial pancreas that will benefit diabetics worldwide.

Leicester resident Julian Wright, 50, who has type 1 diabetes, has been through the six-week study. He said: "I lost more than a stone in weight over the six weeks with DMU. Taking part in the study also gave me a real sense of achievement that I'm doing something positive and giving something back. I realise how important this is. I've got kids and the chances them becoming type 1 is high. Hopefully this study will work towards something that will benefit them and others in the long run."

The project consists of exercise on a static bike and levers and weights training, twice a week for 6 weeks. Volunteers are also paid £120 for a completed study

Volunteers have to pass a health check to participate and lots of measurements and a small number of blood samples are taken as part of the study.

Julian added:

"You take the study seriously but working with the learn at DMU is real good laugh, they make you fee part of family

The exercise in the study is moderate and low risk. The project aims to compare type 2 insulin users with type 1 insulin users and type 2 tablet takers. The only group DMU is short of is type 2 insulin users.

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
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






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Skateboarding to the Max!

Soon local skateboarders will be goofy footing, grinding and doing a nollie on Western Park as their new skating area opens in the summer.

The concrete skate park – which is also suitable for use by people with stunt bikes and scooters – replaces a steel half-pipe which was reaching the end of its useful life.

The £80,000 project secured £24,166 of its funding from a community regeneration programme called Transform Your Patch, after a public vote put it in the running for funding. The project was then match-funded by Leicester City Council.

Transform Your Patch is a partnership between environmental charity Ground-

work UK and soft drinks brands Britvic and Pepsi-Co. More than 160 spaces including skate parks, playgrounds and sports pitches across the country have already benefited from Transform Your Patch funding.



Cllr Piara Singh Clair, assistant city mayor responsible for culture, leisure and sports, said: "I'm delighted that a public vote helped us to secure funding for this project – it shows that the demand is there. And it's good news that we were able to provide match-funding to ensure this is a quality facility that will stand the test of time."

Cllr Dr. Susan Barton, one of the local ward councilors for Western Park, added: This is going to be a great addition to the facilities on Western Park. I can't wait to go and watch it being used. I'd like to thank all the volunteers who contributed to the working group that put the bid together, the funders and all the people that voted for the scheme."

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A Pint and a Play

Leicester's only pub theatre has kicked off its summer season and already has an eclectic mix of productions lined up.

Upstairs at the Western's Summer Season runs until 2 August and this season the venue is also delighted to be teaming up with West End Neighbourhood Centre on Andrewes Street, featuring a puppetry workshop by Effigy Theatre Company on 30 July. The state of the art centre features bespoke facilities for the disabled. Producer Verity Bartesch said: "Our new partnership with the West End Neighbourhood Centre is an important development for the West End, providing further opportunities for everyone to join in creating and enjoying theatre in wonderful facilities. We hope to continue to bring performances to the Centre with future seasons.'

Puppetry workshops for children and adults are also available Upstairs at the Western on 26 July (children) and 2 August (age 14+) together with a performance by Effigy Theatre Company on 2 August.

Participatory theatre continues with I Wish I Was Lonely on 13 June. Unusually, this is a show where the audience commit to leaving their phones ON and asks the question: how much of ourselves have we given up to the new gods in our pockets?

Laughs come in the form of local comedian Dan Nicholas with two shows: one with comedian Jack Campbell for These Boyz Need Therapy on 14 June and returning with his manic chat show Conversation Garden on 19 July.

If you fancy something dark and humorous Far From the Sea features power, place and the industry of war (2 and 3 July). New work also comes in the form of Original Ink in collaboration with Scufflebox Theatre Company and Upstairs at the Western. Simon's Birthday (27 and 28 June) is a new play by three local writers - who is Simon and what's so special about his birthday?

Local poet Jess Green caused a media maelstrom earlier this year with her poem Dear Mr Gove. Jess also hosts a monthly spoken word show Find the Right Words Upstairs at the Western on 18th June.

Come to Upstairs at the Western this summer you're sure of a cool pint, a warm welcome and some great theatre.

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GLASTONBUDGET ROCKS IN THE MUD

Dear Lord it was muddy but Glastonbudget, the world's greatest and best tribute band festival, was back celebrating its tenth anniversary in blistering style over the May Bank Holiday Weekend and it just gets better.



Over 30 of the UK's top tribute bands were performing along with 100 additional artists, many of whom had passed auditions in Leicester earlier in the year.

There's such a lot happening you have to pick your favourites. An one act finishes on the main stage, the muddy hordes bimble across the fields to the next band and back again as another head-liner gears up. It's non stop and all the better for it.



These tribute bands are excellent, the best in the county and possibly as good as the originals. Certainly if you've never seen the super groups in their prime, then Glastonbudget is only place you can see Queen, Oasis, Pink Floyd, Iron Maiden, the Arctic Monkeys and more on the same bill.

This year seemed busier than last when around 12,000 revellers turned up to enjoy tunes blasting out of five stages in the sunshine but this year

'muddy' is an understatement. Following a Friday night deluge the grass turned thick, deep brown and gloopy. That didn't stop some soggy games of football and some adventurous types careering face down along a mudslide. Well it needed to be done - it is a music festival after all.



The music ranges from the 60's to today and it's unfair to single out the best because it's all down to personal taste in the end. For my money the best I saw were Glastonbudget stalwarts Mercury hammering out their traditionally blistering Queen show. Their website says they have performed for Queen themselves; they're that good and it shows. T.Rextasy with lead singer Danielz, uncanny like Marc Bolan, and his band played a superbly tight set that got the crowd bouncing along in the mud to those legendary glam rock anthems. Who's Who recreated the raw energy of a Who stage shows and did it with precision to the extent that a lead guitar got smashed up on stage, it took several goes. In the big tent, the Darkside of Pink Floyd masterfully sent their audience Comfortably Numb with delight as they dived into Pink Floyd's catalogue of greatness. Another hit on the wall you could say.

The Saturday night headliners were the Bootleg Beatles, arguably the finest Beatles tribute band in the world, they took us on a stylish tour de force of the Fab Four's musical career, recreating the looks and sounds from the 60's through to the 70's. Utterly stunning and I'm not a Beatles fan but damn they're good and now I want a kaftan.

Glastonbudget is a unique experience. It promotes up and coming bands and artists, it recreates the sights and sounds of some iconic musicians, it's great value for money and enormously entertaining. I suggest you book next May's second Bank Holiday off and grab a ticket and a tent. You won't be disappointed.

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
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June Police Update

The Smart View with Sgt. Rod Smart On 12 April, a thirty seven year old man from Braunstone Town was arrested for racially abusing a taxi driver on Fosse Road Central.

He was issued with a police caution. Three days later a 22 year old local woman was arrested for racially abusing a taxi driver on Fosse Road North. She has been charged with racially aggravated threatening behaviour. These incidents show what our taxi drivers have to endure on a regular basis.

During the early hours of 15 April a 17 year old local youth was spotted coming out of a hair-dressers on Glenfield Road by officers patrolling. He was subsequently charged with burglary and remanded in custody.

On the evening of 27 April, a grocery shop was robbed on Hinckley Road, with the sales assistant being grabbed and kicked. Fortunately the victim did not receive any serious injuries and the CCTV footage was good enough for the police to be able to identify the offender. A 29 year old Braunstone man was arrested a few days later, charged with robbery and remanded in custody.

On 2 May a burglary took place on Wentworth Road, where the offender climbed through an upstairs window, having scaled a drain pipe. This method of committing burglary is quite rare, but residents are advised to fit window locks to upstairs as well as downstairs windows when close to drainpipes or flat roofs.

On 7 May a 48 year old Wigston man was arrested on Blackbird Road, having been seen waved his genitalia towards the window of a business premises. When interviewed, he gave an explanation that he had forgotten to button up his trousers when he left home, drove to Upperton Road then walked to Blackbird Road where things slipped out. Police and Crown Prosecution Service were less convinced by his explanation and he has been charged with indecent exposure.

At about 8am on 21 May, a drunken 29 year old local man was arrested for kicking a car on Luther Street. The man was charged with criminal damage and disorderly behaviour.

Over the last few weeks we have seen a number of burglaries where Yale type locks have been 'slipped', allowing entry without causing any damage. Local residents are reminded that in order to ensure proper security, external doors should be fitted with five lever mortice locks.

In the last edition we mentioned a 34 year old local woman being charged with theft after a spree of shop thefts involving washing powder, meat and Easter eggs. We are pleased to announce that she has now been imprisoned for thirty four weeks.

Tony Huxley's Compost Corner

My peach tree is now adorned with thumbnailsized fruits, which means it's time to overcome my greed and thin out the crop. Left untouched, they would produce a mass of inedible golf-ballsized peaches. I will aim for a spacing of about 10cm or more. In two months time this spacing will

be increased to 20cm or so. Other trees can benefit from fruit thinning, especially apples, pears and plums. Avoid allowing large clusters to form by removing the central or "king" fruit. These are often damaged by the pressure of neighbouring fruit and invite infection and pests into the crop. Remove any rotten



fruit to prevent the spread of fungal diseases. Fruit trees are prone to a whole range of pests and diseases. Birds and squirrels can be a problem for most fruit tree crops, but other than netting the tree or camping out with a rifle (which tends to make the neighbours nervous), you have to accept the losses. Sap-sucking insects such as aphids and scale bugs are pests common to most fruit varieties. Look for sticky or distorted leaves or a trail of ants that are harvesting their syrupy excrement.

My favourite pear tree has already lost most of its crop to pear midge. It's too late to spray now but collecting and destroying the stunted blackened fruit should reduce re-infection.

With certain moth pests,

pheromone traps can be used as an organic control, or indicate whether spraying is actually necessary. Some insecticides are unsuitable for use on fruit trees, so check the instructions to see if they're appropriate. Some products cannot be used close to harvesting time. Reduce the threat to beneficial insects like bees by spraying in the late evening.

If you're vigilant and take early action you can look forward to happy fruit picking when autumn comes!

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
