

You would think the remaining severely damaged buildings, earmarked for demolition, would be hallowed ground and that no one would dare set foot in them. You would also be wrong.

As our exclusive photos show, squatters moved in and created even more carnage, including knocking down walls to gain access to more of the property and a nearby lockup. Witnesses say that an unusual number of high value items were left in some of the rooms; including dozens of bikes, TVs and stereos.

Equally worrying; needles and human waste were found

and the electric supply had been bypassed. It is a massive insult to those who lost their lives.

The Tick-Tock Of History

It was quite an event in the city in 1868 when Joseph Goddard's iconic Clock Tower was completed. Carved on four sides are four historic figures: William Wyggeston, Thomas White, Alderman Newton and Simon De Montfort - each associated in different ways with the life of the city. From the door at the base of the tower: access to the city's network of drains and sewers! In 1926 Coalville followed suit with a brick clock tower of its own - one of the most impressive structures, according to the architectural historian Nicholas Pevsner, in an otherwise fairly bleak architectural landscape.

The first clock greeting many travellers visiting the city is the lofty clock atop the Midland Station, similar to those at a number of Midlands railways mainline stations. The Leicester one is easily visible from streets leading to the station. Not far away, above the former Leicester Mercury building, is a digital clock, giving the temperature as well as the time.



Very impressive is the clock on the attractive bell tower above the Town

Hall which itself was built not long after the clock tower was opened. This offers superb views over the whole city if you mange to climb to the top.

One of the oldest parish clocks in the country is to be found in the redundant All Saints Church in Highcross Street. High up under the roof is a Jacobean masterpiece with striking jacks under a picture of Old Father Time. Luckily for those seeking access to the clock, a replica is to be found in the Guildhall, where the striking jacks still regularly mark the hour.

Not far from the Guildhall is an interesting clock above the entrance to Clockwise Credit Union on Jubilee Square. This was presented to the Leicester organisation by a linked Credit Union in Castlebar in the Republic of Ireland.

I have only touched on a few local clocks in this short piece. However when you next pass a clock in the city, remember that there may be quite a story behind it. **Roger Blackmore**

DNU 600 students take part in projects to make a difference to the city

More than 600 students took part in the biggest one -day volunteering project in Leicester's history.

The 26 teams of De Montfort University students took part in 42 different projects throughout the city, including at Fosse Neighbourhood Centre, Westcotes Library and the Brite Centre.

DMU's Faculty of Business and Law teamed up with Leicester City Council for A Day for Leicester. Bus company Arriva also offered the students free travel across Leicester for the day.

Activities included helping out at a lunch club, removing thousands of stickers blighting the city centre, meeting councillors, supporting neighbourhood surveys and clearing rubbish from community spaces. They also met community leaders and residents.

Students also carried out a mass public opinion survey

March Police Update

Despite February being the shortest month there has been no shortage of action from your local policing teams across the New Parks/Western, Westcotes and Fosse wards. A co-ordinated series of 3 drugs warrants were completed in New Parks after concerns were raised about drug dealing in the area. Officers recovered class A, class B drugs and a firearm which are now off the streets! Two persons were

arrested and are still under investigation. You can see a video of the officers working on the warrants on our Twitter page Hinckley Road Police or via Facebook on our page Fosse, Westcotes and New Parks Police.

On Friday 8th of March, and following up on reports of a strong cannabis smell, officers identified and raided a terraced house on Fosse Road South.



250 plants were discovered in 6 rooms behind heavily fortified doors. The fuse box had been bypassed to supply power for the grow. This was a sophisticated setup and investigations are continuing. Please continue to report your concerns through Crimestoppers by calling 0800 555 111.

In response to an incident of Robbery on Bede Park local officers responded swiftly leading to two persons being arrested and charged for that and a number of previous robberies in the area! Proactive police patrols continue in the area and we, our partners at De Montfort University, have already made significant improvements to the lighting and CCTV in the park.

Tony Huxley's **Compost Corner**



After an unseasonably warm February, followed by a dip back into more

normal temperatures, spring has finally pulled its act together as the daylight finally starts to stretch out into summer.

There's a lot to do for the enthusiastic gardener. Mowing the grass, after giving your tools a thorough clean and oiling, might be first on the list as the warmer weather last month kick-started grass growth. Mine's already a couple of inches high.

March's weather can still be erratic, so pick your gardening time when the chance of frost is lower. But now is the time to start weeding and hoeing over the borders, remembering to dig mulch into any bare soil and remove as much moss and weeds as possible. Not forking out dandelions, for example, can result in an ongoing battle lasting for years. Nutrients can be washed out of the soil at this time of year too, so dig in an organic fertiliser or surface material, after having removed any straggling weed seedlings. As March warms up and plants show new growth, gently remove any winter mulch from the beds and borders, to acclimatise them. The weather can still be cold and the Emma Greasley

wind occasionally strong, so take your time and remember to tie any delicate plants to supports. Take off dead blooms from bulbs and strip perennials of old leaves, stalks and seed heads. Roses can be pruned back and fed to create long stemmed and bushy flowers followed by a blast of black spot killer.

For vibrantly colourful blooms throughout the year, plant tender bulbs and tubers every two weeks until the middle of June. Gladiola. lilies and dahlias are a good start.

This is also the month to plant primroses and pansies. Spring plants like tulips should also get a healthy dose of feed before and during flowering.



The vegetable patch should be thoroughly dug over and weeded before adding well rotted manure and compost ready for the peas, onions, leeks and carrots. These should already be in seed trays and kept in a cool greenhouse prior to planting in April. But early potatoes can be planted in a well mulched trench about 6 inched deep at the same time as the onion and shallots.
