Trackway To Motorway

Most of us all know that historically Leicester was built where the River Soar could be forded and later, bridged. The Romans drove their long distance route from the Devon coast across Britain to Holton-Beckering near Lincoln using this crossing point to establish the town of Ratae Corieltauvorum as a key point along what they called the Fosse Way.

Trackways had, however, existed in Britain long before the Romans arrived and it may well be that parts of the Fosse Way had existed as ancient trackways many centuries before.

Water transport had become important long before land travel to central areas of the country like Leicestershire became popular. Thus we can still trace the route of an ancient trackway leading out of Leices-



ter, by way of what is now Scraptoft Lane, up over the Tilton plateau making its way to Stamford and the River Welland. In other parts of the county we also find traces of old pathways linking up with rivers such as the Wreake and the Soar Gartree Road, running south east out of the city towards the Welland, was certainly used by the Romans but is in reality a good bit older. Its route is not only traceable but still largely in use either as a road or pathway along almost its entire length.

Not quite as easy to trace is the road which the Romans used to link their town of Ratae Corieltauvorum to their fort near Mancetter on the Watling Street which we now know as the A5. This route passed through the vicinity of Glenfield and Ratby but the exact route is difficult to determine. We do know however that the forts along the stretch of border between current day Leicestershire and Warwickshire were well fortified. This was done in the aftermath of the famous rebellion of Queen Boadicea (or Boudicca) who met her end somewhere near Nuneaton.

High up on this border country, further to the south, we find High Cross, where the Fosse Way traverses Watling Street. In Roman times many regarded this point as the dead centre of England, though the commemorative monument there is of a much later date.

Today we live in the age of rapid road transport, yet Fosseway and Watling Street are still in use. The M1 and the M69 are entirely twentieth century creations but still follow in the cart ruts of those ancient trackways.

A fire pit is one of those little luxuries that you never knew you needed. There is nothing like a real fire with logs and marshmallows, crumpets and mulled wine.



Those useful Swedes have ensured there is a grill top for it so you can mull your wine and toast anything that comes to hand without burning it!

It's all very sanitised and 21st century though. There is a bit of me that longs to stick a giant hunk of meat on a spit and roast it over a fire. You can buy spits that you have to sit all day and turn but I imagine the feast you have at the end of that day is amazing. There's something primal about a big

hunt of meat over a fire and it stirs my inner Wilma Flintstone. That said, I can probably live without it. I came home from a long trip recently and when I walked into the house I was immediately drawn through and out into the garden by the dancing flames. It was lit and waiting for me, there was hot chocolate and crumpets and it was perfect. Instead of staring at the television I stared into the fire like my cave dwelling ancestors and it was properly magical. Whether I still feel that way in the depths of winter when the ice is forming I don't know, but I do know that a day without fire is a day wasted.



PARKING CHAOS CONTINUES

Western Park residents are fighting to reclaim their driveways following the opening of the new Christ The King Infants School on Glenfield Road.

They say that since the school opened a year ago, the traffic at that end of Western Park is chaotic. The road is impassable twice a day, causing cars to back out onto the main road or be left parked in the central reservation and over residents drives. Both sides of Glenfield Road are affected

The Letchworth/Glenfield Rd Traffic Action Group presented the findings of a local traffic survey to City Mayor Sir Peter Soulsby. Their concern focus on the massive increase in cut through traffic as a result of the school and the rise in speed along Westfield Road and Letchworth Road. They felt it was "an accident waiting to happen".



The Traffic Action Group say: "Lots of data was

presented at the September meeting at Dovelands School which did not reflect the situation clearly.

"It was stated that the area is a 'high priority' for traffic improvement measures. It would be fair to say that the meeting was disappointing for the lack of detail and consideration of the problems that exist and are urgent".

Digging Castle Hill Country Park

The last two weeks in September saw the community excavations of the Knights Hospitaller's Preceptory at Beaumont Leys. The excavation was run by the University of Leicester on behalf of the Story of the Parks project and attracted amateur archaeologists from across the city.

Gazette reader and amateur local historian Robin Matthewman, from the Castle Hall Archaeology Project, said 'Our excavations have uncovered well preserved evidence of medieval buildings and yards. Large quantities of pottery suggest occupations of the 13th century which fits with the Knights Hospitallers. The finds have been fantastic compared with what was originally expected'.

The site comprises a ditched and banked enclosure containing the remains of a Preceptory, a monastic complex formerly belonging to the Knights Hospitaller, and buildings designed to provide for the knight's domestic and religious needs, including hospice accommodation for travellers and pilgrims. In later years, the site probably functioned as a monastic grange or sheep farm; the receipts from which funded the Knights Hospitaller's campaigns in the Holy Lands.

The site was in use from around 1240 until 1482 and later went on to become a deer park for the Kings of England before being sold off. It eventually was used by Leicester Water Board Corporation as a sewage works from 1891 and 1965. At 250

acres, It is probably the largest park in Leicester.



The excavation has found remnants of possibly two buildings which have been dismantled in later years when all the timber support beams where removed. Both of these seem to be lesser buildings but there are loads of roofing slates - and the nails to hold them on - dumped throughout the excavation. The success of finding this has delighted archaeologists as many thought it had all been destroyed by the sewage works.

It is hoped that this community excavation can be repeated next year so it further extends learning of this historic park.

If you haven't been, the park can be found in Beaumont Leys off Astill Lodge Rd and info about it can be found on the City Council's website.

SAMHAIN

Halloween; that time of year when the clocks turn back and the long dark nights are upon us.

Across the world, and here in West Leicester (where we do it in style), many of us dress up as ghosts and ghouls to go trick or treating with our carved pumpkin lanterns, embracing all things spooky and dark. However, this festival was a significant time for our Celtic ancestors in Europe.



The Celts called this festival Samhain (Sow-in) meaning Summer's End and dates back at least 6000 years. This was the Celtic New Year. Without conventional calendars, the falling leaves and first biting frosts were temporal markers. They heralded the end of summer's abundance and the beginning of lean times over the winter months.

At Samhain, the harvest would be in and the animals herded into their winter shelters. With limited food, weaker beasts were slaughtered and the meat preserved to last until the return of spring. The war to survive was fought upon the battle ground of snow and ice. Death was ever present - the weak and old may not live to see the spring.

The Celts believed that at Samhain the veil between the world of the living and the land of the dead was thin enough to cross. Therefore they could commune with their ancestral spirits to ask for guidance and advice to help through the dark times.

By the Mediaeval period this tradition changed from ancestor worship to demons roaming the streets and dressing up as them was a method of defence. This tied in with the tradition of mumming, where people travelled door to door performing short plays in return for food. This where the modern tradition of Halloween and trick or treating has its roots.

In these days of central heating, the winter is not the life and death struggle our ancestors endured. But the cycles of life continue. For many, now is the time to reflect on the achievements of the past year, let go of what is no longer needed or viable, honour our lost loved ones and embrace all that we have. Happy Celtic New Year! Chez


