Many of us won't have heard of him or his music but he has given his name to a stylish new £35 million university building. Roger Blackmore tells us more.

The Story of Hugh Aston

Readers will have noticed the brand new green building next to the Magazine Gateway which was recently opened as the new De Montfort University School of Business and Law.

This new building was formally opened last September and named the Hugh Aston building after an unique sixteenth century Leicester personality.

Hugh Aston was an early Tudor composer whose birthdate, parentage and some of his career are a bit of a mystery.



It is thought he was born around 1485 and is believed to have studied at

Oxford University before heading to London. Aston achieved a considerable reputation as a composer and although only four complete choral

works now exist, his music was almost certainly performed at the court of King Henry VIII and his successor Edward VI.

By 1525 Aston was settled and working in Leicester, as Magister Choristerorum or Master of the Choristers at the College Hospital of St. Mary's later known as the Newarke. His salary, very high for the time, was £10 a year, rising to £12 by 1540. Aston continued at The Newarke until it was dissolved in Easter 1548.

Prior to dissolution, the College provided a rentfree house, which he later bought. This was just outside the main gate of The Newarke, in Hangman's Lane now Oxford Street, in the Borough's first Ward which was later named Southgates.

Before 1530 a Hugh Aston, very likely the same man, since no others are listed at the time, was already representing the Southgates Ward as a Borough Alderman, and by 1550 it was even being referred to in the Leicester Borough Records as "the Ward of Mr Hugh Aston".

From 1532 he was a Justice of the Peace, Coroner for two years, Auditor of Accounts for a total of 16 years, Mayor between 1541-1542, one of the two Borough MPs for the 1555 Parliament, and remained an Alderman until his death.

He was buried on 17 November 1558 in his parish church of St. Margaret's.

March Update

From Hinckley Road Policing Unit

A team from Hinckley Road Police Station carried out two Test Purchases operations, checking licensed premises for underage alcohol sales.

In the Fosse area, 18 premises were visited of which two failed the test and in Westcotes, 27 premises were visited where eight failed. These operations are continuing.

Two men were arrested in February after enquiries revealed that they were responsible for a burglary which had just occurred in Western Park. They have now been charged with 3 burglaries.

Another male and a female were arrested in Derby in relation to Distraction Burglaries that have been committed in the Midlands and within the Hinckley Road neighbourhood. Digital Audio Broadcasting or DAB is the future of radio they said. "Phooey!" Says Richard Perry who knows a thing or two about radio matters.

Nice Box - What's in it? Richard Perry

Nearly all of Leicester's radio services can be heard on the DAB platform, but you'll need a DAB radio to receive them and a plethora of other digital only services.

The original idea was to migrate traditional radio listening onto DAB which would also offer more choice, better quality and free up FM and AM for other uses.

When the BBC spearheaded the launch of DAB in 1995, a receiver would cost you £800; today you can buy them in a supermarket for £25. For that, the set should automatically tune to your station of choice, offer scrolling



text and on more expensive models, a pause and record feature. With sales of sets hitting 10 million - so far so good.

Although the take-up of DAB radios and digital services in general has been healthy it's not been fast enough to stop Channel 4 axing 3 digital stations. Others going or gone, due to low listenership, include The Jazz, Capital Disney, Core, BBC 6, The Asian Network and almost Planet Rock.

The other big problem is poor coverage and occasionally muddy, signal quality. This is down to the low "bit rate" used in the transmissions in order to jam as many stations into the available space as possible. Originally the bit rate was supposed to be double, which would have created stronger, high quality signals but fewer radio stations. This never happened due to a "more channels the better" philosophy and the system's lack of flexibility. This has now rendered it obsolete in the face of the much better DAB+ system which has been adopted world wide, except in the UK, Denmark and Norway where it is incompatible with our DAB radios and transmission systems.

The Government have set a 2015 deadline for the switch over to DAB with the proviso that over 50% of radio listening is on our present DAB. At the moment, it's at 13.7%, as we gallop towards an expensive obsolescence as fast as we can.

We've spent our hard earned cash on shiny new DAB radios, broadcasters have pumped millions into digital services and transmitters and it's all second rate before it's got off the ground.

Whoever are the prime movers in the death of Jesus, there is mockery of a judicial process, with false witnesses, and immense pressure on the one who had power of life or death to succumb to popular emotion and condemn someone he knew to be innocent... how many times in this world are all those ingredients in play, as highlighted by Amnesty International and similar watchdog groups?

Here surely is yet another sickening example where love is defeated by brutality ... statesponsored brutality inflamed by religious bigotry and persecution. Doesn't all that have a depressingly modern ring to it?

Defeated? In thousands of churches on Holy Saturday, in the darkness will be lit the Easter candle... suffering, brutality and oppression and death do not have the last word... still bearing the marks of His Passion, the Risen Christ will come and breathe the Holy Spirit and His gift of peace on us.

Tony Huxley's Garden Tidings



Unless winters glacial cold has slipped back across the county, Spring should be well and truly here. My first tulip has already come and gone. Now other dormant garden goodies should be starting to resurface.

Not everything rising from the ground is making a welcome return. The scariest baddie is Japanese Knotweed. This Ninja of the plant world regenerates from the tiniest fragment of root, so it can't be dug out. The ground it grows on is classed as toxic waste! Thinking nothing of pushing up through tarmac or concrete, it resists all but the strongest weed-killers.

But has Knotweed met its match in a foe little bigger than a pinhead? The Government plans a controlled release of Knotweed sucking bug *Aphalara itadori*, pleasantly known as "jumping plant lice". *Aphalara's* sap sucking young don't kill ⁴ the plant but does slow its spread.
