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#### FRIARS MILL OFFICE SCHEME A WINNER A £2.3million office development at the heart of Leicester's Waterside regeneration area has won a regional planning award.

The new Fabric and Riverside office buildings at Friars Mill were awarded the Excellence in Planning for a Successful Economy prize at the Royal Town Planning Institute East Midlands Regional Awards 2019.



The city council-led development has created over 11,000sqft of modern office space in the grounds of the historic Friars Mill development, on the banks of the river Soar.

The new buildings have been designed to complement the character and industrial heritage of the  $18^{\text{th}}$  century mill complex, part of which was badly damaged by fire in 2012. The council painstakingly restored the buildings as part of an award -winning £7.1million redevelopment scheme.

#### **TURRET GATEWAY NOW SAFE**

One of Leicester's most historic ancient monuments is no longer at risk, following the completion of a major programme of restoration.

The Turret Gateway in Castle View was added to Historic England's 'Heritage at Risk' register in 2017, following concerns about its condition. But, after a £138,000 scheme of essential repairs and careful restoration, the gateway will no longer feature on the 'at risk' list, when Historic England's new register is published this month.

Last autumn, the 15<sup>th</sup> century gateway was shrouded in scaffolding while work got under way to replace its slate roof, repair its metal grilles and replace masonry that had eroded over time.

The city council's contractors -- conservation specialists, Messenger - worked under the supervision of Historic England to carry out the works on the Grade I listed building.



Historic England's Louise Brennan, said "In a couple of years the gate will be 600 years old, so it's great to have such an important monument for the city looking its best".





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#### **Fruity Business in Leicester**

The Bournville Estate, built by the Cadbury family in the south of Birmingham, was famous for its advanced environmental thinking. As Quakers, the family had considerable concern for the welfare of their employees. Thus attached to every house was a garden and a fruit tree.

Such forward thinking spread to other cities. As demand for new housing was developed here in Leicester's West End and Western Park area, so the provision of gardens became increasingly important.

Many of the later properties had several fruit trees, amounting in some cases to the planting of a



small orchard. It is interesting that a few of these trees survive to this day in the Westfield Rd area.

In the inter war years, as well as during wartime and post war rationing, many families took to keeping chickens and enjoyed the fresh eggs they provided, as being far preferable to the murky grey scrambled egg powder otherwise available. Rationing and scarcities provided a major incentive to growing things in the back garden or on any other suitable open space.

More recently, interest in growing herbs and vegetables at home has flourished. Keeping allotments is a very popular activity nowadays, not just in the UK but worldwide. Even the former First Lady, Michelle Obama, insisted on creating a vegetable patch on the White House lawn. .....But details of that are perhaps more in Tony Huxley's province!

Project Hive is run by the WWCE, a group of local resi-PROJECT dents raising funds to redevelop the former Eco House into a community space.

Regular readers of our articles in the Gazette may have noticed that we have been building towards something significant since the summer. Festival appearances, Parkrun marshalling, new sign-age at the Eco House site, video filming, scarecrow trails and a charity takeover of the Chef & Spice restaurant have kept us very busy.

But now we can now reveal that...

In a joint partnership, Parmar Properties and the Western Ward Community Enterprise have entered into an agreement with Leicester City Council. This is a significant step forwards for us as we can now proceed to the next stage of our project with further fund raising and the initial stages of the design phase for the redevelopment of the Eco House site.

We will be holding a public consultation meeting at **Dovelands Primary School** on

**Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> November** at **7:30pm** and we would like as many local residents and stakeholders as possible to come along.

During the meeting, you will have the chance to hear our vision for the new community space on the derelict Eco House site; see the initial plans for what the space will look like and talk with us about your views on the project, plus find out more about how you can support us as we embark on our crowdfund period.

Our crowdfund period begins in early October, and will run until the end of December.

The target for this stage is  $\pounds 26k$ . It's vital we can demonstrate that a significant number of people are behind Project Hive during this time. When we hit this initial target, we will be able to show national funding providers that there is wide scale public support and obtain the capital costs (estimated  $\pounds 400k$ ) we will need to complete the redevelopment.

Larger contributions will be rewarded with permanent, personalised feature as part of the build. £50 pledges will receive an individualised vinyl wall sticker as part of the decoration of the interior of the building. £100 pledges will have an engraved brick and £500 an engraved paving slab incorporated in the grounds of the completed project.

It is important to us that we continue the ethos of the original Eco House and ensure that the



building and its construction have minimal impact on the environment. Our design plans include installing solar panelling, a grey water recovery system and an air-sourced heat pump. Therefore, we are asking for pledges towards a feasibility study to include: early design stages, a tree survey, a quantity surveyor and a solicitor.

Your support will mean that these key components are in place from day one and are fully integrated into the structure of the building.

Let's not have this building stand empty and derelict any longer. Let's bring the space alive: support Project Hive!



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# Oct Police Update

Hello to all the readers of the Western Park Gazette. I am Sgt Ed Jones and have taken up the mantle from Mark Brennan at Hinckley Road police station. I wish Mark all the best for the future and thank him for all that he has done for community policing.

Your teams, as ever, have been busy patrolling the beats both overtly and covertly. They have executed a number of search warrants, successfully seizing drugs and stolen goods which we have been able to repatriate with their rightful owners. Your teams continue to arrest those who seek to cause the most harm within our community. As Criminal trails are completed we are seeing their hard work coming to fruition including the cannabis seizure in the summer which saw the removal of over £180,000 worth of drugs from the streets, two people imprisoned for which deportation awaits upon completion of their sentence.

A big thank you to all of you who continue to report suspicious activity. It is these snippets of information that help us piece together criminal patterns and behaviour. I would always encourage you to report anything you think is suspicious either directly or anonymously through Crime Stoppers on 0800 555 111.

Across the whole of Leicestershire we are experiencing a rise in tool thefts from vans. It is an unfortunate reality that tools stolen from one vehicle are then used to break into another. Some simple precautions will reduce the risk of becoming a victim. Where possible lock away your tools in your home. At night make it more difficult to access the rear or side doors of your vehicle by parking close to walls, garages or other vehicles. Mark your property in a way making it unique to you. Mark it in a place that is not obvious so that it can not be altered or removed . Don't forget to photograph it! Identifying stolen property is so much easier if we have pictures. If you can, invest in some good quality lighting and CCTV.

It was CCTV that proved to be the downfall of a brazen thief who a stole an e-bike from a local business. Caught on the shops' camera, the offender was recognised by your local officers. Their arrest was swift and charges followed. The perpetrator is now incarceration at HMP.

#### Tony Huxley's Compost Corner



#### Autumn always feels so transitory;

a short phase quickly passed en route to winter. Keats called it the "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness". With summer fading and weather forecasters predicting another Beast from the East, autumn could whistle past before we know it, so don't delay those pre-winter jobs.

It's all weather dependent of course but October will be the last chance to mow the grass, lay turf, trim hedges, prune back perennials and pick any remaining fruit. Where necessary always clean and oil your gardening tools before locking them away for the winter. It's a chore but it makes things so much easier in the spring.

But before you put your kit into hibernation, now's the time to plant spring bulbs. It's also a good time to plant onion sets and garlic. I've had great success with onion varieties "Stuttgarter" and "Turbo". Plant in well drained soil to avoid water logging. Push each set into the soil until the tip is just above the surface. A net or pack of onion sets can go along way so I usually save half for sowing in spring. Plant garlic the same way. I just sneak a bulb or two from the kitchen, making sure to leave

some for culinary purposes and vampire slaying activities at Halloween. Break into individual cloves and plant like onion sets. Check regularly as birds and other animals often disturb them. Simply push dislodged bulbs back into the soil.

No self respecting veg patch should be without rhubarb. Autumn is the time to correct any such deficit. For best results plant in a well dug sunny spot and treat to plenty of muck. Resist the temptation to harvest any stalks the first season to allow the plant to establish.

Other vegetables that can be planted now include early peas, broad beans and spring cabbage. Be sure to protect



from birds and rodents with fine netting. Bare root Wallflowers are now available. Plant this autumn for early bedding flowers next year. They're usually sold in bunches tied with an elastic band. Check the stock is fresh and healthy as they can quickly wilt and rot and befit only for the compost bin. Now get digging and beat the ice and snow! **Tony Huxley** 



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
